Consolation Series in Annual Tournament

REDMOND CREW IS SECOND BEST

Local District Champs Win First Consolation Tilt Of Tournament

The 1929 hoopers "snapped" at Redmond and they are really kicking at the Redmond 29 to 21 Thursday afternoon in the first consolation game of the state tournament.

It was a tilt replete with close checking, fouls and missed shots. With Dallas always in the lead but Redmond constantly threatening. The central Oregon boys made their best showing in the third period, outscoring Dallas 9 to 5.

Quiring proved to be Dallas' scoring ace with 12 points. Vaughn trailing him for once, possibly because he was more closely watched. R. Smith and Tyson divided scoring honors for Redmond, which did not show the form it had exhibited in the game with Eugene Wednesday, especially on defense.

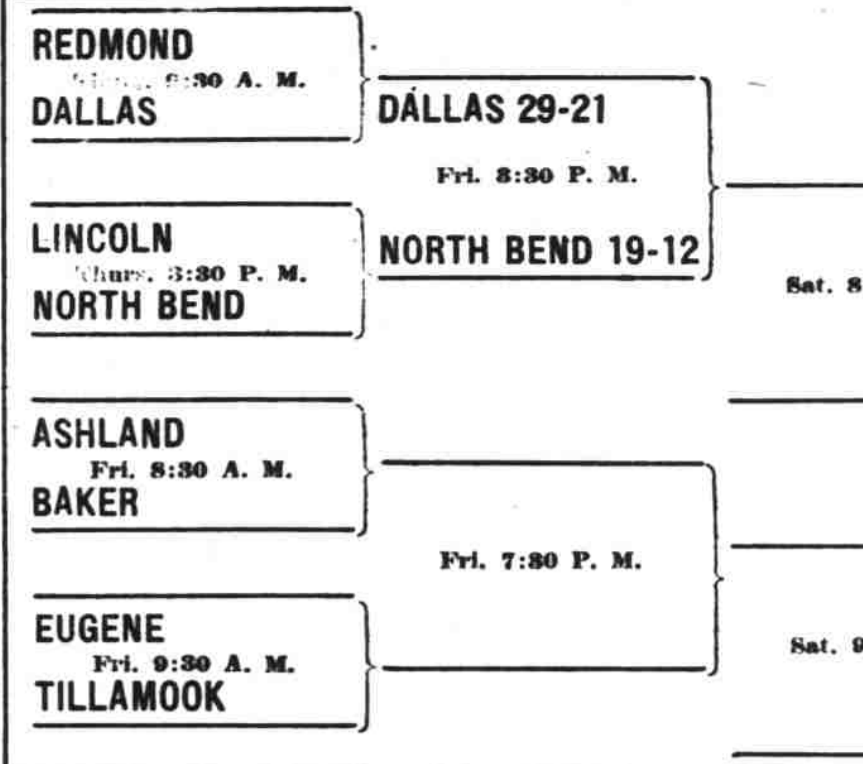
