

Lumber Tariff Passed in Senate by Margin of One Vote

LEATHERS YET ON FREE LIST

Senator Jones is Leader in Fight for \$1.50 on Soft Woods

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—Single vote margins today determined the fate of the two remaining major rate controversies in the senate tariff contest. One placed a tariff on soft wood lumber and the other, for the fourth time, kept hides, leathers and shoes on the free list.

Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, won the last important struggle over the bill's administrative provisions by placing in the measure an amendment providing for presidential suspension of duties on all commodities in which monopolies are found to exist.

Tariff Passage Urged by Week-end
Going into another night session after three weeks of daily eleven-hour continuous sessions, party leaders were making a final drive to pass the long pending tariff measure before the week-end. Plans were being laid for a week's recess after passage to catch up with their office work and to get a little recreation from the six and a half months of tariff tinkering.

The vote of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, defeated the fourth attempt to transfer hides, leathers and shoes from the free list. With the amendment of Senator Oddie, republican, Nevada, about to carry by one vote Borah switched from "aye" to "no" before the result was announced, making it 36 to 35 against.

The Oddie amendment was defeated last week by 42 to 37. It gained the floor again when a motion to reconsider, made by Senator Herbert of Rhode Island, carried 34 to 33, another single

vote margin which kept the senators in a high pitch of excitement during the early evening hours.

Borah Makes No Explanation of Vote
Senator Borah made no explanation for his change of vote. He has favored high protection for hides all along, however, and has opposed duties thus far proposed on leathers and shoes. Oddie's amendment would have provided higher duties on hides than proposed by the house bill and lower rates on leathers and all shoes except women's.

Senator Jones of Washington won a rate of \$1.50 a thousand feet on lumber of fir, spruce, pine, hemlock and larch by 39 to 38. His vote of 32 was rejected previously, 39 to 34.

WASHINGTON, March 20. (AP)—The Pine proposal for a tariff on oil and petroleum products was revived in the senate tonight, and was defeated without a record vote. A motion was agreed to, however, that a record vote be had tomorrow at noon without further debate.

PERSHING PRESENTS MEMORIAL BUILDING

Wednesday in Washington, D. C., between the hours of 3:30 and 4:30 o'clock, a dream started toward reality by the Women's Universal Alliance, January 11, 1925, became an actuality when General John J. Pershing presented to the mothers of the world, the stately marble building built under the auspices of the Mothers' Memorial Foundation of the women of America. President Hoover accepted in the name of the mothers, and Senator Fess of Ohio made the address.

The idea is that this building, built to last for centuries, will stand as a continual memorial to the mothers of the United States and the world. There is a room in this building for every state in the Union. There is provision made for organizations such as the War Mothers, the Gold Star Mothers and such like organizations, whose membership represent women who have given much in their capacity as mothers.

All the women of the world are welcome in this building at all times and it will be made definitely as a meeting place for "motherhood," regardless of the nation or creed. This meeting place is in the center of the building and is called the "Hall of Nations."

Educational and welfare work is planned to be carried on with headquarters in this memorial building. There will be columns upon which will appear the names of illustrious mothers; pictures of outstanding mothers will hang on the walls. There is to be a library devoted to the great deed of the women through all ages and there will be a national home for music and the theatre.

Prominent women from all over the country have been acting on the advisory board during these five years of construction. Among the women is Mrs. J. A. Carson, of Salem, whose name was recommended by Governor Pierce during his administration.
