

McNary Files Candidacy With Secretary of State Monday

SENATOR GIVES OUT PLATFORM

Protection for Forest Products Included in Projects Favored

Charles L. McNary, United States senator, Monday filed with the secretary of state here his candidacy for re-nomination and election.

"If I am nominated and elected," read McNary's platform, "I will continue actively to support legislation having for its purpose permanent tax reduction, practical relief for agriculture and its allied industries, adequate protection of forest products against foreign competition and conservation of our forest resources consistent with their economic utilization."

"I also favor enforcement of the prohibition and narcotic traffic laws, effective labor and child welfare relief, educational advancement, federal pension legislation and generous care of veterans and their dependents. I favor reasonable restriction of immigration, improvement of Oregon rivers and harbors, federal funds for development of feasible irrigation projects, development of Oregon's commercial in industrial resources, just wage for federal employees and adequate retirement legislation."

"Present United States senator, Oregon, development, improved agriculture and law enforcement," is the slogan adopted by McNary. Charles Hall of Marshfield has filed his declaration for the republican nomination for governor. "Industrialize Oregon. A business man for governor," is Mr. Hall's slogan.

Greta Garbo is genuine in voice, in tone is a surprise but it fits her personality and figure—it is no, but you hear it. That will be better than for me to attach adjectives to it. She is also genuine in acting which is polished, and artistic.

In the final scenes she rises to dramatic heights that has never been excelled in any screen play which it has been my pleasure to see. Charles Bickford also does the best work he has ever done according to my taste.

George F. Marion is wonderful and so is Marie Dressler. To see Marie Dressler doing tragedy produces the queerest sort of feeling. She does the same fine work, and she manages to put something into her acting that makes one choke up a bit instead of laughing.

"Anna Christie" as these people do it is not a play—it is real life. One feels the dynamic forces, the unfairnesses, the mistakes, and the power of love, as these elements are found in every day life surging through this picture. It may have been an imagination on the part of Eugene O'Neill, but its facts are real life. O'Neill should feel very pleased with the work of this play. It is so much more realistic than the stage play—the scenes—the swell of the waves, hears them hit with terrible thud against the decks, one hears the deep throated whistles of boats as they pass each other in New York harbor.

a senate inquiry into dry enforcement. The committee took no action on the resolution today. It invited Attorney General Mitchell to appear before it next Monday.

Giving a picture of prohibition conditions, the commission chairman told of his interviews with the dry law administrators and said he would question the integrity of only one of them.

He told of the importation of whiskey from British and French possessions of the Atlantic coast by a number of fast ships equipped with tanks with a delivery hose.

"They make a connection, probably in radio, with some point on the coast," he said, "run in and discharge their cargoes into tank wagons in a very brief space of time and are off. A great deal is brought in that way, which nobody knows."

He cited that exportations from Canada to these islands along the Atlantic coast had increased by more than 900,000 imperial gallons to a total of 1,259,667 for the year ending March, 1935. He expressed belief that "in all probability that increase largely came into the United States through some of the ports along the Atlantic coast or the Gulf."

He estimated that of the 100,000,000 gallons of industrial alcohol manufactured and sold last year, 5,000,000 or 5,000,000 gallons was diverted into the bootleg trade. He advocated some system of forcing the permits of industrial alcohol to make a report of what is done with the product.

YOUTHFUL LOVERS FOUND DEAD IN CAR

LYONS, Kas., March 24. (AP)—The bullet pierced bodies of Will Schrader, 25, farm hand, and Helen Starr, 20, daughter of his employer, were found in a car parked on an obscure country road, 12 miles southwest of Raymond in the lonely Salt Marsh hunting grounds.

The car was noticed by a cattle man Friday but was not investigated because hunters frequently leave their automobiles parked in that section for hours.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schrader, living at Hutchinson, Kas., and the girl a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Starr, living on a nearby farm.

First advice was the two were killed in a suicide pact following a lovers quarrel. A coroner's jury will hear testimony Monday when Schrader shot himself after Miss Starr was fatally wounded with the shotgun found in the car.

TARIFF MEASURE IS PASSED BY SENATE

Bill Goes Over and Is Sent To House After Extended Work of Solons

WASHINGTON, March 24. (AP)—The Hawley-Smoot tariff bill was passed by the senate late today by 53 to 31 and goes to conference with the house for adjustment of hundreds of differences between the two congressional branches.

The measure, as it won the senate's final approval after an 11th hour arrangement from a half dozen democrats and republican independents, carried 1,253 amendments to the house text approved at the other end of the capitol last May 28. It had been before the senate since September 4.

A general revision upward of farm duties, including that on sugar, and scores of increases and reductions in the industrial rate group were provided in the compromise document. It received the support on the floor roll call of 46 republicans and seven democrats; 26 democrats and five republicans voting against it.

House leaders announced after vote, which ended at 4:50 p. m., that the bill would not be brought up in that branch for the routine procedure of sending it to conference until next Monday. This respite, they said, was to allow the 435 house members to study the completely re-written bill.

Many members of the high school drama classes and one of the English classes which is now reading Hamlet are expected to attend.

Alderman Vandevort said within the last few days an agent of the water company had called at his home, attempting to collect water bills for a period covered in receipts he had in his possession.

Bus Franchise Also Will Be Submitted

The council also passed a companion ordinance calling a special election May 16, coincident with

the primary election, to vote on this charter amendment and on the referendum of the exclusive bus franchise for Oregon Stages, Inc.

The public utilities committee, which presented the plan for a popular vote to test sentiment on the municipal ownership issue, was authorized to prepare an affirmative argument for the voters' pamphlet, and any councilmen, not to exceed three, who may be opposed to the proposed charter amendment, were authorized to prepare a negative argument.

Alderman Johnson, Rosebraugh and Purvine were absent. The latter has not returned after undergoing an operation in Portland.

Collection Fees Ordered Paid By City's Aldermen

The bill of Charles Miller, who has been collecting delinquent license fees and sidewalk assessments owed to the city, for services amounting to \$271 was approved by the city council at Monday night's special meeting.

Alderman Dancy objected that Mr. Miller's employment had not been authorized by the council, and added that he had done work long ago by the city treasurer. Mayor Livestrey advanced a further objection that the payment amounted to \$1 or 25 per cent of the amount collected, which he deemed rather high.

Alderman Patton, who moved to approve the bill, replied that the usual rate for collecting delinquent accounts is 50 per cent.
