Miss Reger has had many years experience demonstrating ranges and cooking on them easily, efficiently and economically in her long suit. Miss Warner also will lecture on many of the short cuts she has learned by cooking on the oven-controlled range.

Not only will Elizabeth Reger demonstrate the efficiency of the range, but she will demonstrate the best method of refrigeration yet discovered.

Refrigeration in itself is very simple. Everyone has cooled food by the simple method of evaporating water from a cloth wrapped around the food. It removes heat from the food. Cold is the absence of heat, so to cool substances we must remove the heat.

One means of refrigeration and the simplest, is by the vaporization of a liquid. This can be tested by wetting your finger and holding it in the wind. You will notice it feels cooler as the water vaporizes. The gas refrigerator works on a similar principle. By allowing a liquid to vaporize, the heat of the box is absorbed; in fact the heat in the refrigerator causes the liquid to vaporize.

Food has longer life. Canned and fish are kept very well in this gas refrigerator. Tomatoes have been kept a whole month without shriveling. Cream has been kept for 10 days.

The refrigerator is a dry-cool, which of course is the most sanitary type of refrigeration.

GRUNDY OUT AFTER SENATE REELECTION

PHILADELPHIA, March 27.—(AP)—Senator Joseph R. Grundy, candidate for reelection to the United States senate, is held by appointment, in the field for the republican nomination.

It was authoritatively announced tonight that the senator's petitions for the republican nomination would be filed in Harrisburg Monday the last day for taking such legal action.

If the senator had any intention of withdrawing from the race as a result of the action of his running mate, Samuel S. Lewis, in getting out of the contest for the gubernatorial nomination, he has changed his mind.

There were widespread rumors that the Pennsylvania senator, disgruntled with the support he was receiving from state leaders, might announce his withdrawal from the senatorial contest. Color was given to this when Warren F. Doane, one of Grundy's representatives, was quoted as saying the senator would issue a statement today.

Late today Doane announced there would be no statement and tonight it was given out that the senator's nominating petitions would be filed.

ANOTHER REVOLT IN PRISON IS QUELLED

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 27.—(AP)—An uprising of more than 1,500 convicts in the Missouri penitentiary today, the second within 24 hours, was speedily put down with the use of tear gas and clubs to subdue about 400 of the most rebellious prisoners, and drastic disciplinary measures were put into effect tonight to prevent further disorders.

Ten convicts were injured, none seriously, in the melee which took place at noon in the main prison dining room after 750 convicts had refused to leave the hall.

Prison guards and state militiamen shot about 400 of them after the other 250 had fled outside under threat of an attack.

REPUBLICAN GROUP SUPPORTS HOOVER

BANGOR, Me., March 27.—(AP)—The state republican organization in state convention here today adopted an 11-plank platform without a dissenting voice being raised from the floor.

The prohibition plank approved "the course" of President Hoover, pledged him "our support" and held that candidates selected as republicans were in honor bound to conform in their actions.

Praise of the state and national administration was voiced.

Arthur M. Hyde, secretary of agriculture, principal speaker, asserted the federal farm board was attempting to "work out a plan whereby New England agriculture through possible cooperation with producers in other parts of the nation could organize and achieve" beneficial results.

He said the agricultural board was considering recommendations by a committee of potato growers as the basis for a plan which would permit a nationwide farm-er-owned and controlled cooperative for marketing potatoes and replacing the credit given by "speculative potato interests."

UNIVERSITY CHIEF TALKS TO STUDENTS

The importance of going to college and the place the college graduate is taking in the world of business were topics of high school students at their regular assembly yesterday by Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University of Oregon.

ARTIST AIRS VIEW AT MURDER TRIAL

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 27.—(AP)—Henri Marchand, artist, took the witness stand today to tell of an intimacy without love with Lila J. Emerson, Seneca Indian on trial for plotting the murder of his wife.

His relations, he told the jury and a packed court room, were established and maintained in the name of "professional necessity," they constituted his method of getting a reluctant model to pose for his Indian museum groups.

The method, Marchand testified, had been used with other Indians in other places, notably on a Canadian reservation.

He did not know, he told the court, that Lila, disappointed when his attentions ceased, had plotted as charged by the state, to have old Nancy Bowen, Cayuga Indian, kill Clothilde Marchand.

He did not know, he said, that Lila had used letters to convince the Indian the artist's wife was a "white witch" who had placed a curse on Chief Charlie Sasstrass, Nancy's husband and killed him, and would do the same to her.

He did not know when he was working with Lila, he said, on the afternoon of March 8 that old Nancy was at the moment beating down with a hammer and another with a drug the woman he had married 33 years ago.

Never at any time in the 10 or 12 years he had known the defendant, Marchand said, had there been any word of marriage.

NEW TREATY IS BEING TALKED

Yankees Make Definite Move For Consultative Pact At London Meet

not directly mention the offer of Secretary Stimson, chairman of the American delegation in London, to consider a consultative pact "with an entirely open mind." The senator said, however, that someone should define more fully what a consultative treaty is.

No Comment Yet Offered by Hoover

President Hoover so far has been silent on the offer of Secretary Stimson to the London conferees to consider a consultative pact which involves no guarantee of military force by the United States.

Senator Borah spoke out after a conference with Senator Swanson, of Virginia, the ranking democrat on the foreign relations committee.

Senators George, democrat, Georgia, and Shipstead, farmer-labor, Minnesota, also members of this committee, likewise disapproved of any political pact.

Any treaty emanating from the London parley must get senate ratification. As chairman of the foreign relations committee, Senator Borah will be called upon to take charge of that treaty before the senate.

Surprise Expressed By Senate Leaders

Senate leaders were plainly surprised at the London proposal for a consultative treaty, believing the president was firmly opposed to any manner of political pact in connection with the efforts for reduction of naval armaments.

"A consultative pact," said Senator Borah in a formal statement, "in which the parties would go forward and discuss the treaty would be necessary to be done in accordance with the realities of the situation would be a pious fraud—and a fraud which under the exigencies of the hour would be rejected."

"It might be helpful if someone in London would define a consultative pact and then place alongside of this definition a further definition of a security pact."

"In a security pact you state in the pact what you are going to do after you have consulted."

"In a consultative pact you conceal what you are going to do after you have consulted, but you will be forced by the logic of the hour to do what they expressly agreed to do in the security pact."

France has demanded the security pact which the United States delegation has declined to enter. With the London parley apparently deadlocked, the talk of a consultative pact suddenly developed this week. Hope for a five power naval agreement was quickly revived.

Tract Bought At Lake Labish By Church Body

Authorization for the Salem Council of Church Women to purchase a three-acre tract near Lake Labish to be used as a community center for the Japanese settlers there was made at the meeting of the council executive board held yesterday afternoon at the Y. W. C. A. Much enthusiasm for the new undertaking was evidenced and the vote instructing the board to proceed with the purchase was unanimous. Mrs. G. N. Ross is president of the council.

A community church will be established on the tract and a recreational grounds for the residents is also planned.

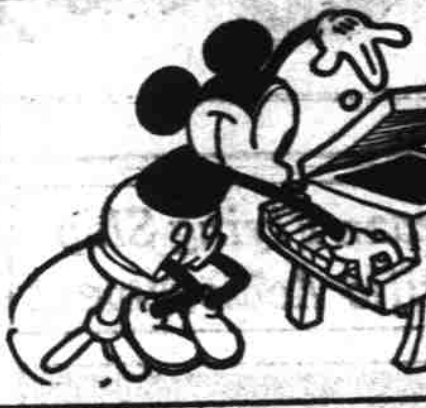

ATTEMPT TO KILL CHARGED TO MAN

Shooting Affair Lands Girl's Father in Court; Suitor Slightly Hurt

PORTLAND, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—Police tonight charged E. K. McKeehan with assault with intent to kill in connection with the wounding last night of Arthur J. Benham, 20, the admiral of McKeehan's 17-year-old daughter, Pauline, after an alleged altercation in front of the McKeehan home here.

Benham was shot through the right cheek. Hospital attendants said his condition was not serious.

McKeehan, who was released on his own recognizance after the shooting, was held in bail of \$2,000 tonight. He told police he objected to Benham's attentions to his daughter and attempted to separate them last night. He said Mrs. McKeehan was at the car, which was said to have also contained his daughter. One of the bullets wounded Benham.

Benham's father denied his son had a weapon, although he was not present at the shooting, police said.
