LUTHER HOUSE IS DEDICATED

Lutheran Student Association Chapel Dedication Is Impressive

MONMOUTH, March 31.—Dedication services for "Luther House," the newly completed Lutheran student association's chapel at Monmouth, were beautifully exemplified Sunday by means of morning, afternoon and evening services which were largely attended by people from over the state.

At the dedication proper, Rev. William Schoeler, student pastor was assisted by Rev. R. Bogstad of Eugene and Rev. W. E. Brinkman of Portland. Mrs. William Schoeler sang, "How Lovely are Thy Dwellings," with Miss Ruth Kraxberger at the piano. The scripture reading was from First Kings 8: 1-13; 22-30; after which an anthem was offered by the McDowell club of the Oregon Normal school. Rev. W. E. Brinkman delivered the sermon, "The Place of the Church in the Community," which was followed by another anthem by the McDowell club; the benediction and Doxology; and Postlude.

The afternoon service commencing at 3 p. m. attracted an audience which would have overtaxed the capacity of Luther House chapel, and, as this emergency had been anticipated by Reverend Schoeler, the use of the Normal school chapel was made available through the activity of J. S. Landers, president of the school.

Musical numbers offered were: "How Beautiful upon the Mountains," a vocal solo by Mrs. J. S. Landers; and an anthem by the choir of the Central Lutheran church of Portland. Greetings were extended by President J. S. Landers; Miss Jessica Todd, dean of women of the Oregon Normal school; and by Delmar R. Dewey, director of teacher training at the normal. Another anthem by the Central Lutheran church choir preceded the sermon, "A Close-up on the Lutheran church," by Rev. Alf M. Kraabel, Portland.

The evening service, held in Luther House, began at 7:30. Scripture reading and prayer were offered by Rev. R. Bogstad of Eugene.

Musical numbers included a vocal solo by Mrs. L. Ludwig of Portland; and two anthems by the choir of the American Lutheran church of Salem directed by William McGilchrist; also a trio by Mrs. Clarence Byrd, Mrs. Ray Johnson and Mrs. Al Scholseth, members of the Salem choir. Greetings were extended by Rev. L. Ludwig of Portland. The evening sermon, "The Foundation Truth of the Lutheran church," was delivered by Rev. H. P. Johnson of Portland. Miss Cecilia Melke of Salem, president of the

Monmouth Lutheran Student association, and a senior at the Oregon Normal school, addressed the assemblage briefly from the viewpoint of a student member.

Expresses Appreciation
Rev. William Schoeler presided throughout all of the services, and in closing expressed his sincere appreciation of all who had participated in the many events of the day; and mentioned many telegrams and letters of congratulation and felicitation received by him from various parts of the United States. The Lutheran Student association in Monmouth serves some 80 student members annually, which is a much smaller number than the one served at Corvallis and at Eugene. "Why did you start your building operations at Monmouth," was a question Reverend Schoeler quoted as having been asked him frequently. The answer he said last night, was "Because it cost less to build here," and gave specific statements showing the validity of his assertion.

Visitors during the day were invited to bring their basket lunches, and the local Lutheran student association served coffee, cream, sugar and doughnuts gratis in the basement of Luther House between the hours of 1-3; and 5-6.
