

Greater Consumption of Dairy Products Will Be Planned

PRODUCERS TO HOLD MEETING

Problems to Be Considered At Session at Chamber of Commerce

Practical means by which the consumption of butter and other dairy products may be increased in Marion county will be considered at a meeting tonight at 8 o'clock at the Salem chamber of commerce auditorium, at which all of the leading dairymen in the county are expected to attend as well as many other persons directly or indirectly interested in the welfare of the dairying industry.

The meeting has been called in connection with a nation wide campaign in the interest of improving the dairying outlook. Invitations sent out to dairymen and others by the chamber of commerce mentioned that although Marion county has 13,700 dairy cows and last year the revenue from this industry was approximately \$1,500,000, a reduction in that income of 20 percent is in prospect this year unless prices for dairy products improve.

proved by congress and the president, which is altogether probable, then the government could proceed with definite plans and construction. This will involve locks and dams to maintain an even flow and would call for clearing out rocks in the channel in certain places.

"This is indeed good news," declared Sam Chambers, president of the Salem Chamber of Commerce. "If this goes through it will be one of the greatest achievements in the history of the chamber."

The Salem chamber had labored long and hard to secure an open river where boats could handle freight all the year round. The organized effort was begun in 1927. In 1928 the army engineers in charge of this district called a conference at Salem where Col. Lukesh of the engineers presided. Shippers, manufacturers, bankers and business men testified as to the need of water transportation; and old river men testified regarding previous conditions on the river. In 1929 the engineers' office at Portland collected data on the probable tonnage available for water transport and the estimate was 300,000. Steamboat men gave evidence as to the probable saving in freight if a four-foot depth of channel could be assured.

River men have said that when the channel is provided so that boats can operate, they will make Salem the head of navigation for the whole interior valley country, handling goods by truck from Salem. By the time the channel work is done Salem would undoubtedly be called on to supply a municipal dock to take care of the freight moving by water. Tonnage available for river transport are wheat, canned and dried fruits, paper, pulp, lumber, clover and other seeds, linen and flax products. For import there would be machinery, cement, grocery products, merchandise, etc.

The local chamber of commerce will continue the work at 1 keep in touch with the Oregon delegation in congress to see that success so far achieved by Senators McNary and Stewer and Representative Hawley is not lost.

JAPANESE ACCEPT THREE PARTY PACT

LONDON, April 1—(AP)—Japan has joined the American-British consortium for naval disarmament, thereby assuring the basis success of the London conference with at least a three power treaty.

A five power agreement, including France and Italy, still hangs in the balance. Both foreign Minister Briand of France and Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain said tonight that the gulf was narrowing rapidly on the security issue. But even with that chasm bridged, an old terror—Franco-Italian parity—still threatens difficulties.

The Japanese government's favorable reply to participation in a five year limitation program proposed by the United States and Great Britain was received by the Japanese delegation early this afternoon. It was decided and studied and a formal answer to Secretary Stimson and Prime Minister MacDonald is expected tomorrow morning.

Important reservations will be attached to the Japanese acceptance but they affect the principles of national naval ratios rather than the limitation of five years. The Japanese government will by settlement that can be arrived at here should carry cheer for British, Japanese and American taxpayers.

Minimum of Three Changes Possible The council lineup is such that six of the present aldermen are sure to be members next year, barring resignations or other unexpected events. If all aldermen who have filed for reelection are successful, there will be only three changes in the personnel.

Holdover aldermen are H. H. Vandevort in the first ward, Hal D. Patton in the second, W. H. Dancy in the third and Chris Kowitz in the sixth. Mr. O'Hara has no opposition for reelection in the fifth ward and George W. Averett is apparently elected for the two year term in the fourth ward by the simple process of filing his petition.

The majority lineup has been settled for several weeks, with Edward Rostein and P. M. Grogan as candidates. Friends of both are making vigorous campaigns and they are expected to wax even more active now that the appearance of a third candidate is precluded insofar as the listing of names on the ballot is concerned.

UNEMPLOYMENT IS ARGUED BY SOLONS

WASHINGTON, April 1—(AP)—Moves for early enactment of pending unemployment legislation followed testimony before a senate committee today by President William Green of the American Federation of Labor, that 8,700,000 wage earners were out of work in February and lost more than \$400,000,000 in pay.

Senator Johnson of California, chairman of the subcommittee of the commerce committee that heard Green, said he would submit three bills to Senator Wagner of New York, democrat, in executive session tomorrow. If the subcommittee is willing, he said, he will submit the measures to the full commerce committee for a vote on Thursday and they may be reported at that time.

Senator Wagner said he would press for early enactment. His plan encompassed in three measures would create a commission to plan public construction over long periods with a \$150,000,000 appropriation. It would expand government machinery for collection of unemployment information, and create a federal unemployment agency.

Johnson, will ask the subcommittee if it desires further testimony.

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TERRIFIC GUSHER IS STILL NOT SUBDUED

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 1—(AP)—While the men who summoned its tremendous power from the depths of the earth made new preparations to harness it, the great No. 1 Mary Sudik oil and gas well dissipated its power and costly cargo into the air tonight for the sixth day since it was brought in.

New connections with which it was hoped to shut in the well were made late today. The well burst forth anew yesterday after it virtually had been conquered, when sand in the gas and oil content blasted its way through a leak and ate the metal master gate away in the same manner the sea enlarges a crevasse in a dike.

Vigilance against fire, which would present an unusual danger because of the large radius of oil saturated territory, was increased today. Deputy sheriffs were assigned to patrol the affected area to guard against chance sparks that might precipitate a conflagration, and airplane pilots were warned not to fly over the field to eliminate the possibility of igniting gas in the air.

In the last 24 hour period 10,504 barrels of oil were recovered from the cellar and earthen pits around the well. The preceding day, 15,400 barrels were recovered. Much of the well's flow has been caught by the wind and disturbed so widely that recovery was impossible.

S O S REPORTED NEW YORK, April 1—(AP)—The Radio-Marine corporation reported tonight that shortly before 6 p. m., its station picked up Friday against Pacific university, a faint S O S call.

WASHINGTON, April 1—(AP)—Congressional action was completed today upon the Dowell bill to increase the annual appropriations for federal road aid from \$75,000,000 to \$125,000,000 for the next three years. The senate adopted the conference report on the measure and sent the legislation to the White House.

The American Automobile association said in a statement tonight that the measure would speed highway construction work in the country by \$100,000,000 a year since the \$50,000,000 addition carried in the bill must be matched by the states.

Under the new legislation the present limitation of \$15,000 a mile may be raised to \$25,000 a mile in states constructing high type roads.

A table of increases that would be provided by the new measure made public by the association, included California \$1,663,647, Idaho \$622,632, Montana \$1,032,092, Oregon \$794,669 and Washington \$766,364.
