
CHURCH READY Woman Evangelist To Start Meetings at First M. E. Church Sunday

A Week's Sermonette What the Church Is For By M. HOWARD FAGAN, D. D.

(Visiting Evangelist, First Christian Church)

If the churches of Salem should go out of business real estate values would collapse, and the best citizens would move away at the first opportunity. There is no more valuable institution in the nation than the church. To be sure it is imperfect, because it is made up of imperfect individuals. For any of us to join a perfect church would be to spoil its perfection.

The church stands for the worship of God. Every church building is an invitation to men to remember God. Oliver Wendell Holmes said, "I find-I have in one corner of my heart & tender plant called reverence that needs to be watered at least once a week." In our age there is no greater need than a consciousness of the reality and presence of God.

There are three great realities in the message of the church -reality of God, reality of sin, and reality of salvation. The church alone proclaims salvation from sin through faith in Jesus Christ. There is no other institution that is set for this task. If the church should become silent the gospel message would not be heard. And every man needs a saviour-one who can save not only from the penalty of sin, but also from the practice of sin. Jesus Christ is that saviour.

The church also stands for the development of Christian character. It opposes all that destroys peace and happiness: it fosters all that brings out the best that is in man. The law of the jungle teaches the survival of the fittest: the law of Christ teaches that we should take the unfit and make them fit. The churches invite you to their fellowship because of what they can do for you, and because of what you can do for them. "Unto Him be the glory in the church."
