MARION, April 4—Laura Hanna Thomas, 18, former Marion girl, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Albert Fennell in Lebanon Monday afternoon following an illness of more than two years.

Miss Thomas was born at Helena, Mont., February 2, 1912, and was brought to Oregon by her parents at the age of one year locating at Marion where she spent ten years of her life. She moved to Lebanon six years ago, making her home with her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Fennell. She was a junior in the Lebanon high school at the time ill health compelled her to give up school life.

EGG PRODUCER WILL EXPAND HIS PLANT

ROSEBURG, April 4—(AP)—An expansion of at least one large poultry plant of Douglas county is announced here coincident with the annual report of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, a branch of the agency which handles the major output of this section.

G. E. Gurney, a poultryman of Winchester, has enlarged his brooding quarters and built a new laying house equipped with wire screen porches developed by the state college to keep birds off the ground in bad weather. He expects to have 2,500 hens for fall production. Poultrymen operating through the cooperative received an average of 33.74 cents a dozen for eggs last year, according to a condensed report issued by the county agent.

The poultry association last year did the largest gross business of all cooperatives of the state.

LINFIELD PROFESSOR TO STUDY ABROAD

LINFIELD COLLEGE, McMinnville, April 4—Prof. W. R. Frerichs, head of the German department of the college for 18 years, left McMinnville Thursday for a year of study and travel in Germany and nearby countries.

He is on a leave of absence from Linfield until September, 1931 when he will resume his post in the college. While in Germany he will study his Ph. D. degree in the University of Greifswald in Pomerania.

The work in the German department was completed for the year this week by holding extra hours of German classes during the year. Prof. Frerichs' successor in the German department next year has not been announced.

BYRD VESSEL RIDES OUT CYCLONE WELL

DUNEDIN, N. Z., April 4.—(FRIDAY)—(AP)—Although the southeasterly gale, traveling between 70 and 80 miles an hour, has not abated, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's Antarctic expedition ship, the City of New York radioed today that she was riding out the storm in the Pacific ocean, midway between here and Papeete, Tahiti.

The bark, with only a top sail and try sail up, had been hove to for nearly two and a half days.

The steamer Eleanor Bolling, Admiral Byrd's other expedition ship, however, reported she was making good time against the heavy seas. Both ships reported that those aboard were well.

A stowaway was found aboard the Eleanor Bolling after the vessel left Dunedin and will be put ashore at Papeete, where the two ships are to join company for the trip to Panama.

Admiral Byrd is scheduled to leave New Zealand from Wellington on April 24 aboard the steamer Rangitiki. At Panama he will board the City of New York for the final stage of the homeward journey to New York.

RUSSIAN RABBI IS GIVEN HARD JOLT

MOSCOW, April 4.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)—Rabbi Lazarev, the chief rabbi of Leningrad, who was arrested February 26, together with Rabbi Yasnogorowski by the Russian secret police on the charge that they had been maintaining illegal connections abroad, was sentenced today to ten years exile in a concentration camp.

Rabbi Lazarev's son was expelled for three years while the head, Zemek Zedek, was expelled for two years. The 14 members of the Leningrad Jewish community who had been arrested for disobeying the regulations laid down with regard to religious communities, also were expelled to a concentration camp for various periods of years.

C. A. Hadley and son from Portland were working on their ranch here Monday.

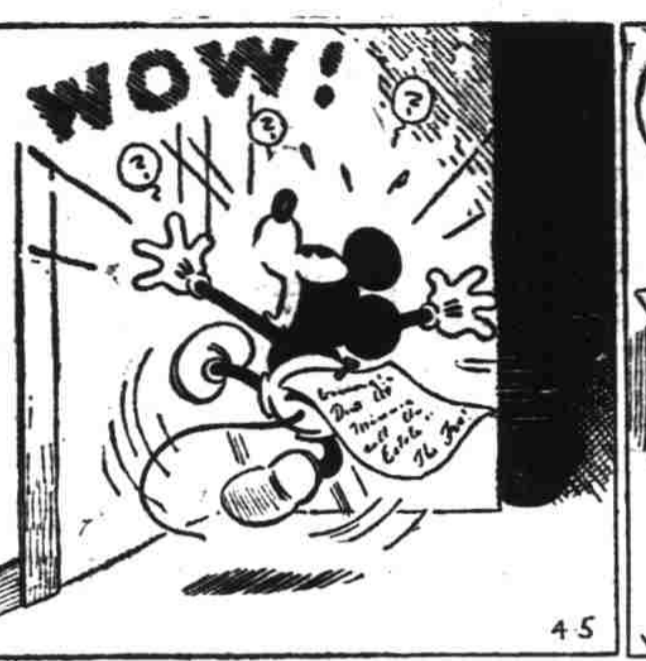
Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Pearson (nee Mildred Cannon) are rejoicing with them over the birth of a son, March 31, in New York City.
