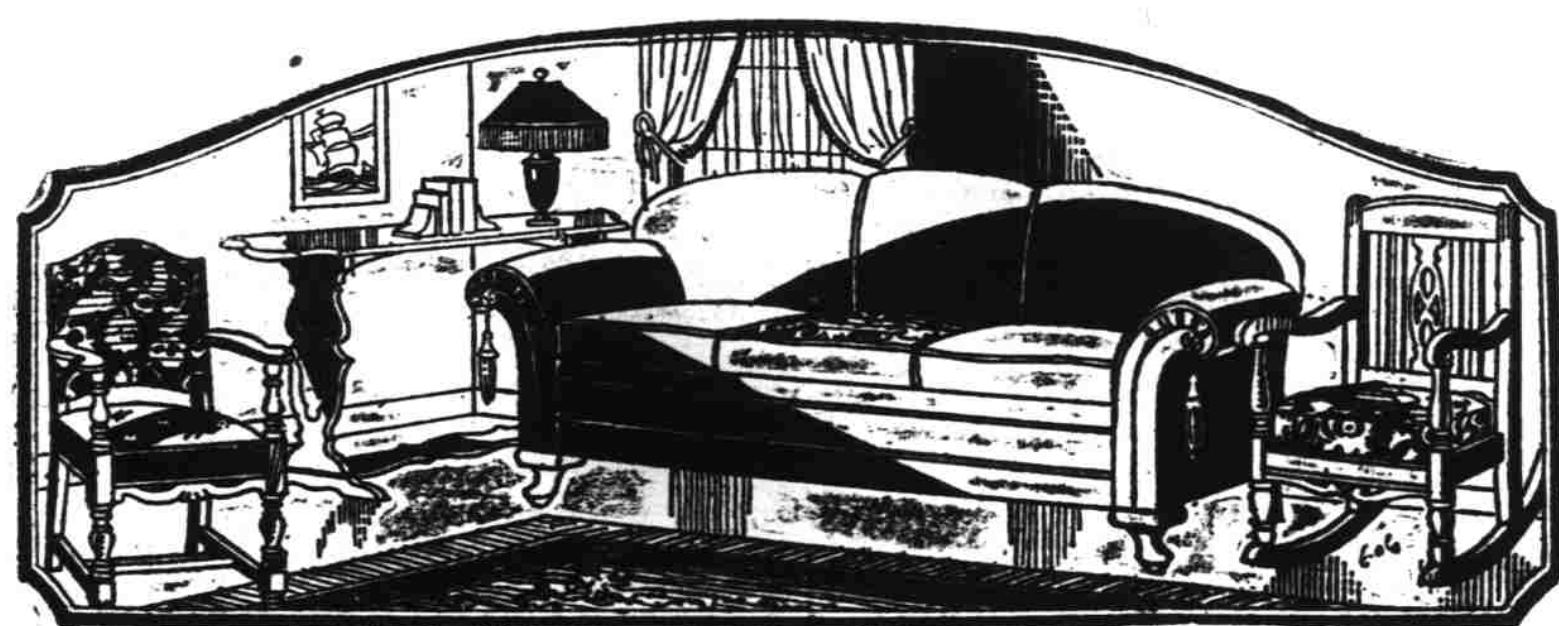
Miss Margaret Sheffer went to Turner to attend the birthday party of LaVerne Whitehead. LaVerne accompanied Margaret home and spent several days with her.
