SILVERTON, April 7.—"The young essentials to success," said A. O. Nelson, local attorney, speaking Sunday afternoon at a meeting of Trinity Young People's society, "are preparedness, honesty, determination, courage, sobriety, care of body and mind, and work." Mr. Nelson spoke briefly on each of the six dwelling more at length on sobriety.
