

Plans Made to Sell 213,000 Oregon Poster Stamps Here

BENEFITS OF DRIVE CITED

More Families to Settle in This State is Goal of Big Campaign

To put over the Salem quota of 213,000 Oregon Poster Stamps, the "Build Oregon" committee here will employ new and novel plans in its campaign here April 9, 10, 11, according to William M. Hamilton, director of the local chapter of commerce and member of the committee.

"This is an age of new and time-saving methods and we believe that every citizen in Salem understands what the state chamber is doing and intends to do in its 'Build Oregon' program, and therefore through the aid of a group of messenger boys the committee is sending out complete presentations of poster stamps to the business and professional men of the city asking their participation and cooperation in the work of the state chamber as if members of the committee were talking to the individuals personally.

"Salem and Marion county have been greatly benefited by the work of the state chamber. Scores of families have been located in the county investing thousands of dollars, and by lending our cooperation and financial support this number can be greatly increased. I believe the business and professional men are going to take active part in this great state wide development program and feel certain that we will attain our quota."

Paulus, and James W. Mott, candidates for the lower house; E. K. Piascecki, who is running for Polk county representative; Martin Ferrey, Miller Hayden and M. Clifford Moylan, candidates for justice of the peace in the Salem district.

About 50 sportsmen attended the banquet, which was presided over by Lloyd D. Idleman, president of the Marion County Game Protective association.

JAPANESE MISSION WORK IS SUPPORTED

Movement of Salem merchants to get behind the mission work for the Japanese settlement at Lake Labish is under way, under auspices of the Council of Church Women of Salem.

First word of this movement came yesterday with announcement that many prominent merchants have agreed to give a percentage of their sales on May 7 to the settlement work, and although visits have not yet been made to all the merchants, the manner in which they are cooperating is declared to be most encouraging.

The Council of Church women, which includes 27 churches in Salem and in which several adjacent churches are also working, has been sponsoring church work in the Labish district for some time, and recently purchased a tract there. But to this point there is need for a larger fund. Mrs. G. Ed Ross is president of the council and Mrs. Melvin Johnson is chairman of the Council committee on Japanese work.

lord of the admiralty, presided and made another attempt to bring up the question of abolition of submarines. He was supported by Secretary Charles Francis Adams, speaking for the American delegation, but the opposition of the French and Japanese has not changed since they arrived in London and Italy would consent to abolition of submarines only if battleships were abolished simultaneously.

With the deadlock on this question continuing, the committee voted to report to the plenary session that no agreement was possible. Thus the question of submarine abolition will be heard of for the last time at the London parley.
