

Airship Brings International Understanding, Byrd Says

REAR ADMIRAL MAKES SPEECH

American Antarctic Explorer Calls Aviation Instrument of Peace

DUNEDIN, N. Z., April 10. — (Thursday) — (AP) — Speaking today at a luncheon attended by New Zealand officials, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd declared his belief that aviation would bind nations closer with ties of peace as great airships soon would be flying over the Atlantic and the Pacific.

"I believe aviation is more an instrument of peace than of war," said the American Antarctic explorer. "It tends to bring the nations of the world closer together and to know is to understand; knowledge lessens criticism."

"In a few years' time, I believe great airships will be flying across the Atlantic ocean and in a few more across the Pacific. Some day I hope to re-visit New Zealand in one of those airships."

Outlook for Airplanes Not Quite So Bright
The admiral did not predict the same development for the airplane, as for the dirigibles, although he believed that airplanes eventually would be flying regularly across great oceans with landing stations established enroute.

To be preserved as one of New Zealand's cherished possessions, the domain design carried by the explorer on his epic flight to the south pole was returned to the government by Byrd, who said he would return the Stars and Stripes to his own government.

I have been looking at the flags together on this table, yours and mine," said Byrd, "and that is how they should be. I hope they will always be so, and I have no doubt they will be together always. As far as civilization and humanity are concerned, we have the same common interests."

Officials send greetings to Hoover and country.
The New Zealand government ministers in cordial terms asked Admiral Byrd to act as an unofficial ambassador on his return to the United States to convey to President Hoover and the people of his country the best wishes from the Dominion of New Zealand.

The state luncheon was notable for the modesty of the utterances by Byrd, who said nothing of his achievements, preferring to be regarded as merely one of the Antarctic party, equally sharing what praise was bestowed.

of St. Louis and then halt at Forest Park.
The expedition will carry a message of greeting from Governor H. S. Caulfield of Missouri to Gov. A. W. Norblad of Oregon. Pioneer Dinner Is Also Scheduled
As colorful as the pageant depicting the departure of the expedition will be the pioneer dinner at a hotel here Thursday evening. Four hundred and fifty persons, part of them dressed in frontier day costumes, are expected to attend. The banquet room will be transformed into a trading post. Furs and relics will be hung on the walls. Tables are to be of rough wood and the menus will be printed on moose skins. The dinner, the principal dish of which is venison, will be served by waiters in costume of the period.

Descendants of the early settlers, members of historical and patriotic groups are to be present. None of the governors of the governors of the eight states along the Oregon Trail was able to accept an invitation to the dinner. Senator McNary of Salem to be heard.

Dr. Howard R. Briggs of Columbia university, president of the National Oregon Trail association, will speak at the dinner. A radio speech by Senator Harry B. Hawes of Missouri, broadcast from Washington, D. C., will be heard by the diners at 8 p. m. Senator Charles McNary of Oregon will introduce Senator Hawes. Old time music and Indian songs will be other features of the program.

Following the dinner boy scouts will present a pageant "The Spirit of the Oregon Trail," in which nearly 150 characters will portray the historical events.
Tomorrow's celebration marks the beginning of "The Covered Wagon Centennial," sponsored by the Oregon Trail association and approved by President Hoover who has set aside the period from April 10 to Dec. 22, for his observance. Celebrations will be held in other cities along the trail this summer and fall.

Harold Clifford Scored For His Administration Of Game Laws of State

PORTLAND, Ore., April 9. — (AP) — Reports were current here today that the removal of Harold Clifford as state game warden and of Edward Clark, his chief deputy, is sought by sportsmen of Multnomah county. It was rumored that members of the Multnomah Hunters and Anglers club have been urged to write Governor

Norblad and the state game commission to have Warden Clifford and Clark ousted.

Rufus C. Holman, chairman of the Joseph-for-Governor club and one of Candidate George W. Joseph's spokesmen, is president of the Multnomah Hunters and Anglers club. The game commission will meet here Monday.

Administration of the state game warden's office as it has been conducted by Harold Clifford came in for criticism at the annual banquet of the Marion County Game protective association here Tuesday night, both from R. J. Kirkwood, secretary of the state association and other speakers.

Principal complaint was to the effect that Mr. Clifford had failed to notify sportsmen's organizations, even when instructed by the game commission to do so, when hearings were to be held on changes in closed seasons or when the closing of designed streams or lakes was contemplated.

Albany sportsmen present at the meeting complained that the closed season on bass, catfish, sunfish and croppies had been changed unadvisedly and without any notice to associations at Albany. Corvallis and Eugene, although not members of the association, also complained that the game warden and his subordinates are responsive to political influence rather than to designated authority.

The outline even went so far as to intimate that "confirmed poachers" seemed to have the inside track for appointment as deputy game wardens.

cal work achieved here will be written into the treaty, but it is hoped that the three power agreement can be drawn up in "open" form so that France and Italy may join later.

Theories Rather Than Facts Set Delegates
The positions France and Italy have defended so stoutly during the long negotiations pertain to national policies rather than to the actual building of ships and the making of shells. Italy does not want to add a ton to her navy, and it is authoritatively understood that Briand has assured MacDonald and Stimson that France is not going to rush building so as to endanger the Anglo-American agreement or necessitate the bringing into effect the safe-guarding clause which Great Britain requests for her protection against the contingency of increased continental fleets.

If this pledge is officially given, the rapid tonnage figures agreed upon by MacDonald and President Hoover last summer will not be threatened.

French Leader Views Situation Calmly
Briand, who has seen conferences succeed and conferences fail, views the situation philosophically, saying that the only thing France and Italy can do in view of the deadlock is to continue their negotiations at another time and place.

Neither France nor Italy can yield on account of domestic political reactions, but each delegation has been more conciliatory lately. The Italian spokesman today declared willingness to resume negotiations with France in Rome, Paris or Geneva.

This was a critical day for the European aspects of the London conference. The British declared their unwillingness to enter into an interpretation of the league covenant on the security question with France alone, demanding that Italy also participate. Grandi, taking such a firm stand against security talks in connection with the conference, could not yield, consequently, the close understanding which France and Great Britain have reached on the question became useless for the purpose of further progress. Grandi and Briand MacDonald will meet tomorrow for final decision.

The final American-British-Japanese agreement was practically completed today by Japan's action in withdrawing her request for the right to transfer 20,000 tons from the destroyer to the submarine category.

With that, the three power experts will meet tomorrow to begin the formal drafting of the London treaty.

"Line up here, you!" he ordered. They did, and docilely they answered the questions.

of non-cooperation with the government, their scope will be broadened to include non-payment of taxes. Resignation of native officials, too, will be sought.

Gandhi has long inveighed against the salt tax as a disgrace to the statute books of India. He has spoken long and earnestly against the government monopoly.

Many Difficulties
Face Law Enforcement

Much of the salt of India is obtained from the great mines of the country. This supply, however, is augmented by salt derived from sea water. This salt residue, though, must be refined by a rather elaborate process to remove foreign matter common to sea water. The plan in Gandhi's followers to simply evaporate sea water produced salt, of course, but leaves with the salt, and inseparable from it, the solids to be found in ocean water.

Further involving the situation from the government's angle is the fact that at very many places in the district of Gujarat where the Gandhi demonstration is centered, there is great marshy tracts where ocean brine is ready at hand. Miles upon miles of these marshes extend through the district. All are free. The government, then, if it seriously undertakes to arrest each violator of the salt tax laws has a stupendous problem. For the purpose of embarrassing the authorities, the evaporation process might be carried on my almost unlimited numbers of persons.

SIENNA CARRIED OVER WIRE OF TELEPHONE

NEW YORK, April 9. — (AP) — The curtain veiling the telephone of the future was jerked aside for a moment today in the first practical demonstration of 529-way television by the American Telephone and Telegraph company.

Seated comfortably in an armchair in tiny rooms that bore little resemblance to the ordinary telephone booths, users of the device described on a tiny sign as "teletone" looked at each other directly in the eye as they conversed, two and one half miles apart.

It was a demonstration of the progress the Bell Telephone laboratories have made in approaching the day when it is hoped to be able to see the person at the other end of the telephone line. It was made possible by a number of improvements in the elaborate apparatus required to transmit and receive clear and easily recognizable pictures by television.

At the other end of the line during this particular discussion of things not important enough to record was Allen Smith New York newspaperman. The speakers congratulated themselves for parading in what they told each other was the first introduction by television of persons who had never met.
