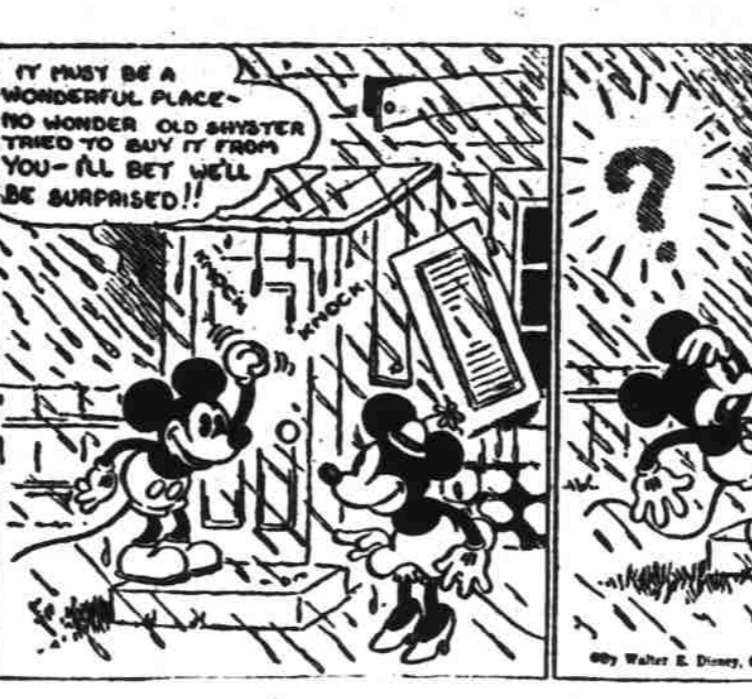
SHIP THIEVES ACTIVE

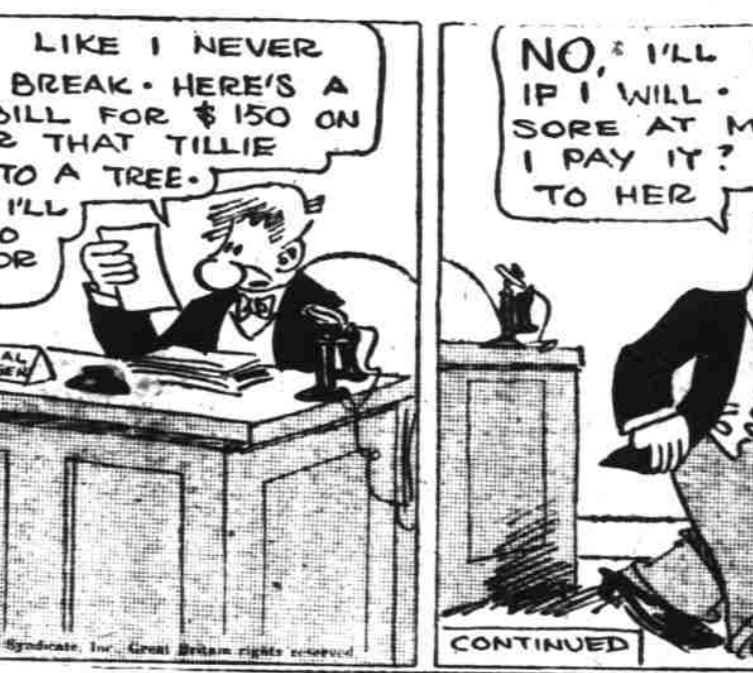
