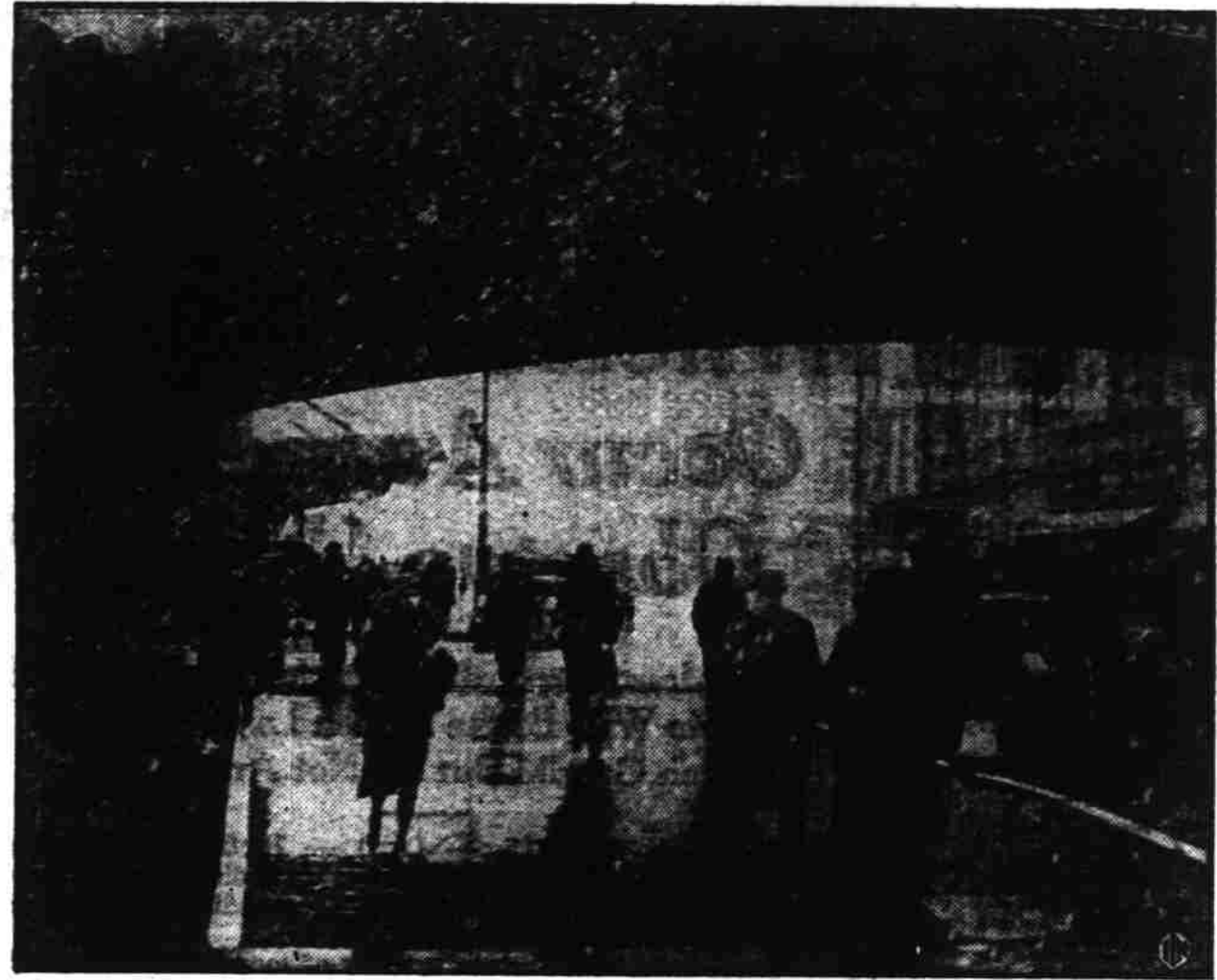

chiefs in competition with local growers.

Ostensibly the duty is made higher even than the growers had asked, but an exception was slipped in admitting frozen or sweetened cherries, practically duty free. The "sweetened" part of it means nothing, Mr. Gehlar explained, and in the past no frozen cherries have been imported.

But this phrase was put in, he continued, to allow import of brined cherries provided they are shipped under refrigeration, a new development in the industry which has been experimented with successfully here as well as elsewhere. The local man believes firms interested in importing European cherries for the maraschino trade sought to establish this loophole.

It has also been learned here that at least one large ocean going vessel is being equipped to transport cherries frozen in this manner.

The import of cherries from Europe has amounted to 12,000 tons in recent years, or about four times the output of the Salem district. If the proposed tariff is effective, it will mean the absorption of this district's output by the processing trade.

If you are suffering from wanderlust, seemingly an inevitable by-product of spring, but are not able to make your escape let me suggest a fine way to fool yourself for at least an hour and a half. Take a look at "Hunting Tigers in India," the feature picture now showing at the Fox Elsinore.

It is an absorbing picture, and so realistic that you will find yourself getting ready to dodge an eleven foot tiger as he crouches ready to spring or you will find yourself almost stop breathing for an instant as an elephant with a huge "box seat" on its back cautiously walks down over a bank which makes staying on its back seem almost incredible, but then you see it done so it must be possible.

The pictures are real. They were taken at the institution of the American Museum of Natural History of New York City and under the direction of Commander G. M. Dyott who lectures by vitaphone as the pictures progress.

The picture has all any moving picture could have—thrill, beauty, and travel—all of it true. The scenes taken in Indian cities are highly interesting in themselves, as well as are the scenes which portray the trip across to India from New York City.

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RETAILERS TO INCORPORATE

Association Threshes Out Its Plans at Gathering Here Last Evening

An organization whose membership is composed of independent merchants who are exclusive retail dealers of food stuffs was completed by a group of representative merchants here Tuesday night. The name of the organization decided upon at the meeting was the Independent Retailers' Association. It was also decided to incorporate and this matter will be attended to by an attorney this week.

A week ago this same group of merchants held their initial meeting and had for their purpose of organizing the promotion of advertising to proclaim the benefits to be derived by dealing with an independent merchant.

The promotion of better merchandising methods among its members, the cooperation with other groups who are interested in the promotion of truthful and honest advertising, the cooperation with the city and state officials in enforcing the weights and measure laws; the peddler license ordinance and the sanitary regulations, are also listed as purposes of the association.

The elimination of trade abuses on the part of manufacturing or distributing concerns was also added to the number of aims.

A membership committee was named and this week will go at the task of signing up new members. It is predicted that more than 125 dealers will be banded together when this campaign closes. Charter members will be accepted at the next meeting which will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms at a date to be announced later.

In the line of legislative activity, it was brought out that a state tax upon the gross sales of chain stores operating within the state may be brought before the legislature at the next session. This American plan has been worked out in other states and was suggested as a statutory provision for Oregon.

Nothing definite in this respect was done at the Tuesday evening meeting but it is probable that the plan will be given considerable attention by the merchants at a later time.

NAVAL CONFAB FINISHED SOON

Final Draft of Treaty Being Drawn Up; Translations To Be Effected

ements concerned and then obtaining final approval.

Ambassador Morrow, as chief of the American drafting section, was so confident the treaty would be signed Tuesday he told the American delegates they could safely pack luggage and be ready for a dash to the boat following the final plenary session which will wind up the conference.

Drafting of the treaty will be finished Thursday and approval of the various governments must then be obtained. The British and American delegations are fully authorized to sign but the salient points of the final pact draft may be cabled to Tokyo and there is a possibility of delay arising thereby, although no mention of a delay later than Wednesday has been made.

Six bulky reports, which were formally approved at Monday's junior high school was elected day and besides furnishing what Prime Minister MacDonald termed raw material for the London treaty they also provided evidence that the conference experts and advisers have been busy during their stay here on the technical phases of disarmament.

The reports are in English and French and cover about 130 closely printed foolscap pages. In size they would make a couple of detective novels and with their drafts and technical terms would provide even more mystery for the ordinary reader.

RED DYNAMITE PLOT BARED BY SHERIFF

EL CENTRO, Calif., April 15.—(AP)—Sheriff Charles Gillett announced tonight his investigation had uncovered a plot by communists to dynamite railroads in an effort to halt the movement of Imperial Valley's cantaloupe crop and force demands of labor upon melon growers.

The announcement was made after more than 100 alleged communists had been arrested and questioned. Twenty-five of the number alleged ringleaders in the plot are held at Imperial county jail on charges of commercial syndicalism.

The arrests were made last night in a raid on a hall where a meeting was in progress, during which the sheriff said, plans to dynamite the railroads were discussed. Another raid on a Bravery, Cal., hall, resulted in additional arrests. Literature and a printing press, alleged to have been property of the ringleaders were confiscated.

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BRITISH MAY HALT BOOTLEG RUM FLOW

LONDON, April 15.—(AP)—America's bootleg liquor problem entered the British house of commons today.

By 215 to 142 the house voted Isaac Foot of Cornwall, liberal, permission to introduce a bill which would bring about suspension or cancellation of certificates of masters, mates and engineers who engaged in the illicit transportation of liquor into the United States.

After the vote was taken Commander J. M. Kenworthy said he had been assured that professional organizations of masters, mates and engineers would welcome the Foot bill. He said they made it plain that they had no sympathy with those engaged in rum running.

The general opinion in parliament today was that the bill had little chance of passing, especially as it was a private member's measure, although there is considerable wet and dry feeling in the house.
