PROBE OF MERGER PROMISED SHORTLY

WASHINGTON, April 16.—(AP)—A full investigation of the plan of the Radio corporation of America to take over the radio activities of the General and Westinghouse Electric companies was promised today at almost the same time that word of the proposal was made public.

A brief statement given at the justice department less than an hour after Senator Bill of Washington, democrat, had called the attention of the senate to report that the plans were under way and demanded an inquiry by the department, said:

"The department of justice announced this afternoon that it was fully advised regarding the proposed affiliation between the Radio corporation, General Electric Co., and Westinghouse Electric Co., in the manufacture of radios and that it was investigating the application fully and was considerably concerned about it."

GERMANS RIOT OVER MODERNISTIC OPERA

LEIPSIG, Germany.—(AP)—An opera about a city where everyone does as he pleases excited audience and critics to the verge of rioting when the piece was performed here.

Entitled "The Rise and Fall of the City of Mahagonny," this highly modern work by Kurt Weill and Bert Brecht describes what happens when no one is prohibited from doing anything he wants to do.

The "free city" is founded by three fugitives from justice, so their utopia attempts no regulation of human conduct. How this results in the inhabitants is shown in assorted orgies in the second act.

Even in this utterly free community, however, the central character ends in the electric chair. He unfortunately allows himself to commit the one crime which no community, however liberal, can overlook: he fails to pay his bills.

All this had too much political flavor for some of those who attended the premiere; for others the orgies were too realistic. So there was great tumult.

D.A.R. OPPOSES ARMAMENT CUT

Resolution Adopted by Session of Woman's Patriotic Organization

WASHINGTON, April 16.—(AP)—Opposing reduction of American armament through the London naval conference, the Daughters of the American Revolution today adopted a national defense resolution calling for adequate appropriations for all branches of the service.

The resolution was accepted after an address by Mrs. Fred C. Morgan of Saco, Me., chairman of the legislative committee of the organization in which she said "the enemy is not only within our gas but without and we do not feel the time has come for us to scrap our ships and render ourselves defenseless as a nation in the face of the present conditions of unrest."

"We, as an organization, have been awaiting the outcome of the peace party in London, and until satisfactory conclusions are reached we had rather go forward with equipment sufficient to meet any emergency than take a chance that the millennium is close at hand," she continued.

"While in no sense are we of militaristic mind, we are not yet convinced that propaganda being circulated has so far transformed human nature that we have arrived at a state where it is no longer necessary to protect American interests," Mrs. Morgan added.

President Hoover appeared before the organization two nights ago to outline the progress that had been made at the conference. Resolutions urging ferreting out of "anti-American" societies and the deportation of their members compulsion of an oath of allegiance from all school and college teachers, and barring of communist propaganda from the public schools also were passed by the organization. More stringent immigration was advocated.

GLIDER SPOTLIGHT SHIFTS EASTWARD

NEW YORK.—(AP)—The spotlight on gliding, centered on the west coast, is shifting to the east.

Capt. Frank Hawks already has flown a glider from San Diego, Cal., in six and one-half days; outstanding fliers will compete in the glider carnival April 25 and 26 at Bay Harbor, Fla., and the department of commerce will hold a glider safety conference in Washington.

Hawks, credited with more experimental gliding flying than any other American pilot, was "towed" across the continent by a plane piloted by J. D. Jernigan, Jr. He actually flew most of the way, however, the tow rope being kept slack.

More than 100 entrants, ranging from novices to first class pilots, will compete in the New York carnival in duration flights with primary, secondary, and soaring gliders and "spot" landing contests.

Prominent figures in aeronautics taking part will include Edward P. Warner, former assistant secretary of the navy for aeronautics as general chairman; Amelia Earhart, transatlantic

flier, as chairman of women's entrants; and Lieut. Ralph S. Barnaby, initial American holder of a first class glider license, as chief judge.

Special exhibition flights will be made by Dr. Wolfgang Klemperer, holder of Germany's first glider pilot's license, Capt. Hawks and probably by Lieut. Barnaby. The carnival will mark the first public display in the east of the various types of glider flying. Its sponsors include the Aeronautical chamber of commerce and the National Glider association.

Promotion of safety in glider operation will be the aim of the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce in calling a conference of supervising and engineering inspectors.

"All available data on the subject of motorless craft will be centralized in Washington for examination and study," said Gilbert G. Budwig, director of air regulation.

"Popular interest in gliding is spreading so rapidly that there is need for uniform knowledge and procedure in order to develop and expand the sport to the highest degree of safety."
