Gay Bridge Tea Compliments Maid

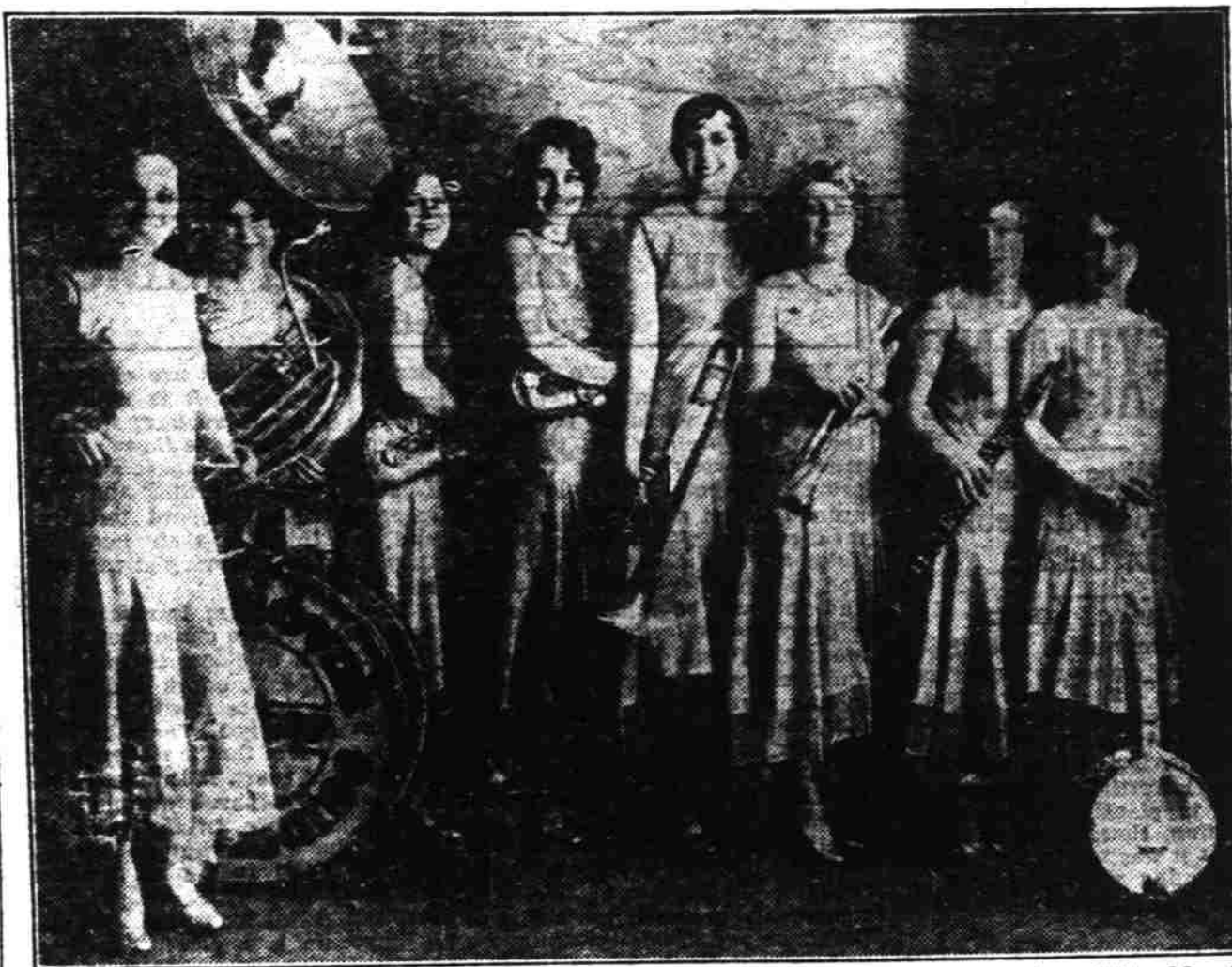
