Is that clear?

Then there's bridge golf, designed for fellows who like to do two things at once. Doc Spears wins the toss and gets first bid; looks over the fairway and bids a nine. Tom Turner feels lucky and bids five; whereupon Bobby Rowe doubles him and he and Doc collect 50 cents each instead of a quarter when Tom gets an eight.

Drinkers' handicap is a formerly popular game now reported to be wanting. Especially good in cold weather. Everybody takes a little nip at the first tee to warm up. Three players do the first hole in par and the other takes a five, so the pros take another nip and the high man is left out. This method has the virtue of evening up the game as the round progresses.

BIG ATTRACTION COMES TONIGHT

Wildcat Has Disadvantage Of About 15 Pounds in Free For All Battle

The Salem armory tonight will be the scene of the biggest drawing card in the way of a professional sports event that has been staged here for many years, according to advance indications, when Al Karasick, the Russian Lion, meets Wildcat McCann, middleweight wrestler who hails from Mexico but is now making his headquarters here, in a two hour wrestling match under Police Gazette rules.

McCann will weigh in at 154 pounds or 155 pounds and Karasick at about 170, so that the Wildcat will be giving away approximately 15 pounds. This is not regarded as so much a handicap in wrestling as a similar differential would be in boxing. Especially under the Police Gazette rules, which bar nothing except choke holds, a smaller man always has a good chance to win on the mat.

Karasick is one of the leading wrestlers in the light heavyweight class on the Pacific coast, and his reputation extends even farther. He is especially noted as a "rough customer," but McCann is not noted either for making tiddle-de-winkles out of the wrestling game. McCann indulged in a satisfactory workout with several opponents Tuesday night after some of his eccentric road work during the day, and announced himself "in the pink."

Extra seats have been arranged for in the armory, and the ticket sale indicates that they will be filled for tonight's match.

"Fastest Left" Ever

"Midget" WOLGAST, COLORFUL NEW FLYWEIGHT CHAMP, WHO POSSESSES THE FASTEST LEFT HAND OF EM ALL!

INTEREST in flyweight boxers increased enormously and suddenly when Midget Wolgast, Philadelphia's wee wop, outpointed Black Bill of Cuba recently in fifteen sparkling rounds at Madison Square Garden. By Genaro as holder of that title, and the world's flyweight championship so far as the New York State Athletic Commission is concerned. However, the National Boxing Association recognizes Frankie Genaro as holder of that title, and the New Jersey authorities accorded their own Willie La Morte that honor. Plans are being made to stage a series of eliminations between these three title-holders. In the meanwhile, those of us who saw Wolgast clearly defeat the speedy Black Bill in their sensational New York duel are convinced that the Midget deserves the crown. Unquestionably it was the fastest bout seen in years from beginning to end. Both boys were in great shape. Wolgast got a cut over his left eye through a collision in the first round, but that seemed to serve merely as a spar. The Midget's marvelous left is a cross between a cobra's strike and a flash of lightning. Many old-timers assure The Sport Bug "it is the fastest left" they ever saw. And it had to be practically that in order to tag the truly Black Bill whose elusiveness was acknowledged by Midget's left hooks to both head and body were the perfection of celerity and accuracy. And there was much steam in them—only the crafty Cuban's knack of riding the matches saving him from the count. Wolgast's real name is Giuseppe La Scala. He lives with his parents and their big family in Philadelphia. This miniature Carnera has been boxing about three years. In more than 110 bouts, he has lost but one—to Phil Tobias of Brooklyn. His best fighting weight now is 110 pounds. Tom McArdle, Madison Square Garden matchmaker, who is arranging a Wolgast-Genaro battle for the near future, says that "Midget is the best flyweight I ever saw." And Thomas saw Jimmy Wilde and Pancho Villa in their prime!
