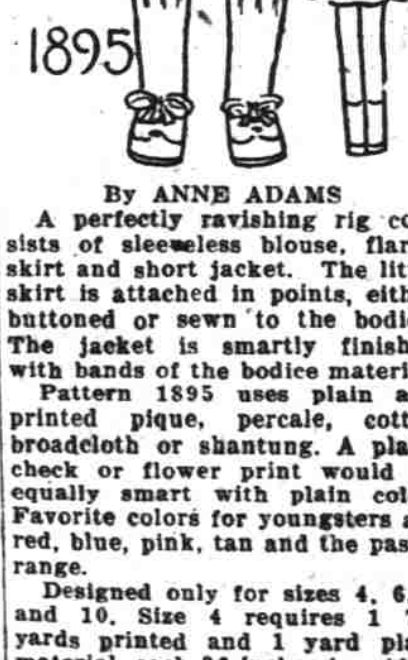
Club Women to Hear Interesting Program
