Of those registering 144 are males and 91 females in the republican list and of the democrats 67 are males and 30 females.

PORTLAND SEEKING ADDITIONAL TIME

PORTLAND, Ore., April 22.—(AP)—A ten-day extension of time for completing the 1930 census enumeration in Portland was asked in telegrams dispatched today by Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, census supervisor, and by the citizens census committee and chamber of commerce combined.

Such action was taken as the result of an agreement reached at a meeting of the executive committee of the citizens committee at the chamber of commerce today. The telegrams were dispatched to Representative Kurell and to William M. Stewart, director of the census and made it clear that the extension was being asked by Mrs. Gerlinger in the interests of the reelection activities of the citizens committee and at the request of the committee.

Mrs. Gerlinger said her office will be prepared to make its final report of Portland's official census enumeration Wednesday, the final day for filing of the report.

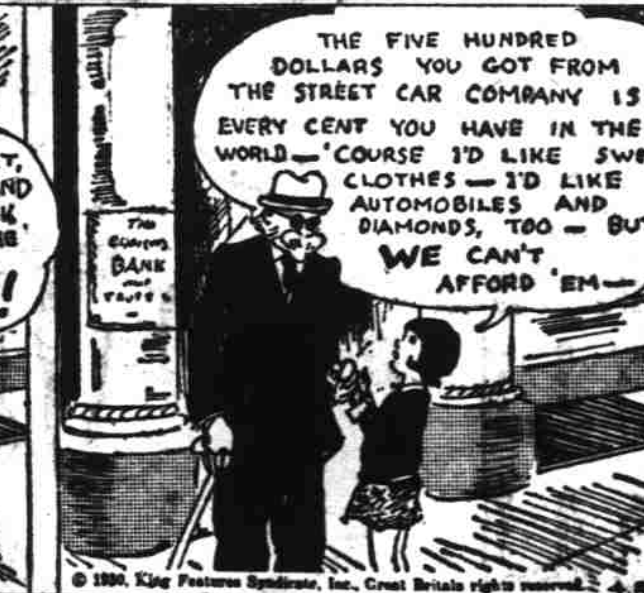

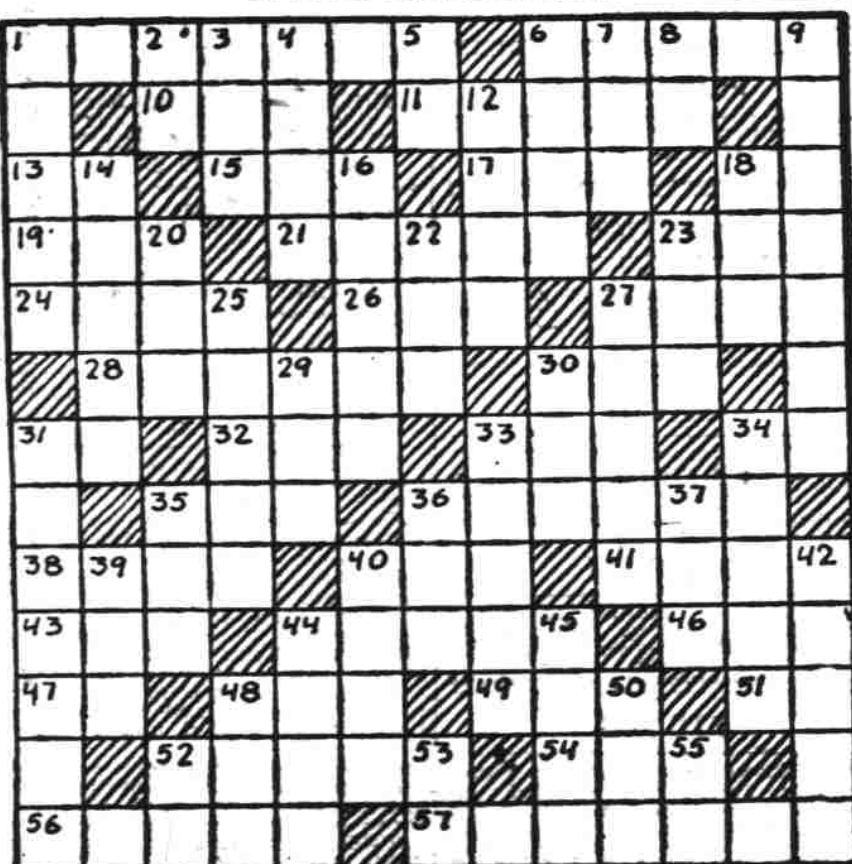
