Carefree, they came to the con-Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States Bureau of Agricultural economics. Feed grains were meeting a fair demand at most markets, but prices generally declined slightly in spite of the moderate offerings. Rye was lower with wheat, while flax had independent weakness.

Crop developments were the

principal influence in the wheat

market. North American wheat prospects were much improved during the week by good general rains which greatly benefitted winter wheat in Texas, Oklahoma and most of Kansas, and furnished an ample supply of moisture for germination of spring wheat in most parts of the northwest. In some areas of the southwest the moisture came too late to more than check deterioration, according to trade reports. Private estimates give the condition of winter wheat May 1 at from 77.5 per cent to around 80 per cent, with an abandonment of approximately 10.5 per cent. This condition of abandonment would indicate a crop around 35,000,000 bushels below last year's harvest. Seeding of spring wheat in the United States is practically completed with a reduction in acrease of about 7 per cent in bread wheat and 15 per cent in Durum, according to trade estimates. Cool weather has retarded growth of early seedings but has favored the development of a stronger root system. Canadian spring wheat seedings were 60 per cent to 70 per cent completed at the close per cent completed at the close of April in Alberta and Saskatchewan, but about 80 per cent seed-
