# Not the time for Salem to buy water system

May 16th you will be asked to vote "yes" or "no" on the question of amending the charter, approving a bond issue of \$1,200,000 to buy the water system.

Naturally there are two sides to the case. Knowing Salem's reputation for fair play, we believe that you desire and will seriously consider all of the facts before voting.

Three years ago the Oregon-Washington Water Service Company purchased the Salem plant. We found it to be inadequately capitalized to serve the needs of the city and to provide for those of the future.

At that time division headquarters, including office and the engineering forces in charge of our other operations in the Northwest, were moved from Portland to Salem.

Our substantial investment here meant that WE WERE CONVINCED OF THE COMMUNITY'S FUTURE.

In every city in which we operate we make provision not alone for present needs but for those far in the future.

In Salem, for example, we are anticipating the development of the city 20 years hence; and it is the watchfulness and care that we exert today which insure your protection as well as our permanence.

Our men are experienced in the operation of water works properties and have unlimited financial backing to meet the requirements for service, no matter how rapidly Salem grows and expands industrially.

We have already spent \$264,000 in improvements and now are investing an additional \$300,000 in a new modern filter plant—a total of over a HALF MILLION DOLLARS.

If it were necessary at this time for the city to take over the water works—if there were any immediate public emergency demanding so drastic a step, the proposal might warrant consideration.

But since the company at this time is perfecting a system to supply Salem with an adequate supply of safe and palatable water, WHY NOT LET US GO AHEAD WITH THE JOB?

There is always time for the municipality to embark in the water business. It is not a prudent thing, with business and economic conditions as they exist today, to BOND SALEM AT THIS TIME IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,200,000.

Suppose Salem were buried under this avalanche of debt, what advantage would it secure that at the present moment it does not possess under the existing operation of a publicly-regulated, privately-owned water plant?

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
