

FOUR SEEKING SENATE JOBS

Summary of Views Given by Quartet of Candidates In This County

Four county for the two senate positions open in the 1931 session of the legislature, will afford, as close a race as any May 16.

Two incumbents are seeking reelection and they are being opposed by two other aspirants for the seats, both well-known throughout the county. Dr. Riley of the Hubbard Enterprise, is overcoming the disadvantage of comparatively short residence here by an aggressive record as president of the Federation of Clubs in the county and by extensive advertising.

Frank Settlemeir of Woodburn, son and grandson of pioneer Oregonians, has served several terms in the lower house and knows as well how to get votes as how to feel at home at a representative's desk.

Senators Brown and Reynolds are equally well-known. Like other candidates, they are pursuing the even tenor of their ways, meeting friends, making occasional speeches, doing little advertising of a newspaper or high water nature.

The statements of each candidate follow:

Lloyd T. Reynolds, incumbent and candidate for re-election for state senator for Marion county in the Republican ticket, was born in Beverly, Ohio, and was brought by his parents, Dr. and Mrs. J. Reynolds to Salem, when he was two years old.

He lived in Salem and attended the public schools. Later he attended Willamette university from which institution he graduated.

After his graduation he became interested in fruit growing while running a farm a few miles north of Salem. During this time he was appointed a member of the State Board of Horticulture for the second district, serving for six years, until he resigned in order to give all his attention to his orchards.

He was elected a member of the legislature for the session of 1927 and served five terms.

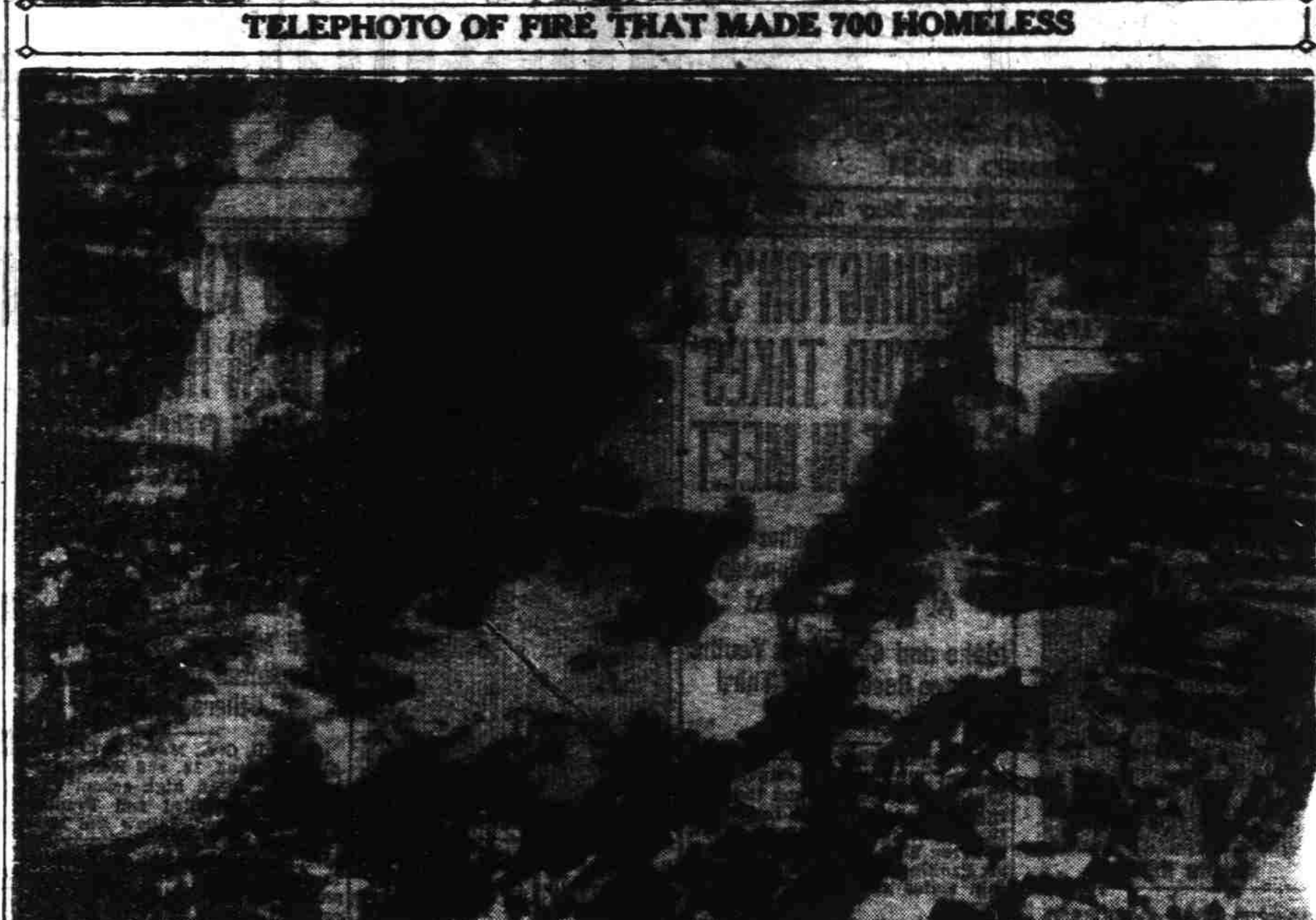
He was elected state senator for the term 1927 and 1929.

He lives on his orchard three miles north of Salem on the Pacific highway.

At present he is district governor of the Lions clubs for Oregon.

He has been president of the Producers Cooperative cannery since its organization.

He is married and has one son.

MRS. PAGE IS SUED ON TWO NOTES HERE

Suit two collect two notes due from Gertrude J. M. Page was instituted Friday in circuit court by Pearl Humphreys, who holds a \$1,400 note signed by the defendant and the Methodist Old Fund, who holds a \$1,100 note signed by the defendant. Interests and costs are asked in both suits in addition to the face of the notes. Both notes are secured by a first mortgage on Salem real estate.

BURNS PROVE FATAL SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—(AP)—O. L. Smettem, 35, of Portland, died late today from burns about the face and neck and mouth poisoning received in a fire which routed occupants of the Lucerne apartments on Sutter street here early today.

M. L. Gottenberg, Silverton Invites Visitors to See His Historic Relics on May 11

SILVERTON, May 10.—The old oaken bucket, the spinning wheel and the lichen-pla wagon are things of the past as far as actual use is concerned. But they are not to be forgotten if M. L. Gottenberg of Silverton can prevent it.

For some time past Mr. Gottenberg has been interested in collecting these old time relics and has managed to gather quite a few of the tools and furniture which were used in the early history of Oregon.

Among these articles is an old lichen-pla wagon with which Robert Harrison left St. Jose, Michigan on March 20, 1852. Two teams of oxen hauled the wagon across the plains and on October 19 it landed at Champoux. A day later it was at Gervais and on October 18 it arrived at Brownsville where it has been since, until a short time ago when Mrs. Gottenberg brought it to Silverton to rest among the old time "treasures" which have been a better day. The wagon was the property of Joe Harrison, a son of the pioneer man.

Many other things Mr. Gottenberg has of interest and on Sunday visitors often call at his home next to the local high school where he gladly lets them inspect his relics and tells them the bits of history that he knows concerning them. Mr. Gottenberg says that usually he is at home a part of each Sunday but that on May 11 he will be home all Sunday and anyone interested in the articles may stop and look at them.

WOODBURN, May 9.—William McGilchrist, senior of Salem gave a splendid talk on Scotland and the poetry of Robert Burns to the Woodburn high school students Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. McGilchrist was accompanied by John George who wore the Highlander's costume and Mr. McGilchrist explained the different characteristics of the costume, telling a brief history of each. He also told of the origin of the bagpipes and Mr. George played a melody of Scotch and American songs on the bagpipes. Mr. McGilchrist played an English concertina and imitated an organ and a violin, playing several Scottish popular songs. He recited Burns' "To a Mouse" and "To a Louse," and talked briefly about the works of Burns.

ROAD PETITION TO BE RECONSIDERED

Petitioners for a 30-foot road to be laid out for one mile from the old Hills Ferry road near Flinzer into the hill district into the south, struck a snag in county court Friday morning. They found that the road they are asking the court to construct, lies within the six-mile limit set by the zoning commission in Salem. In this area the commission has asked that only 60-foot roads be built and the court in former years has indicated its agreement.

The petitioners for the road headed by Farmer Fidler, went back home, deciding they would reconsider their petition.

The 60-foot width, it was said, would take valuable trees from the orchard of at least one land owner, who had been willing to donate the 30-foot strip inasmuch as this was already partly taken by a private road. One of the county officials pointed out that the revenue from the trees might take care of all the present expenditures by the owners along the road on its maintenance from year to year.

The court indicated that it would be glad to consider the matter further when it was decided by the five home owners along the proposed road, whether or not they would grant the 60-foot strip.

ONE FOUND ALIVE IN WRECK DEBRIS

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 9.—(AP)—Ora Paxton, 22, late tonight was found imprisoned alive in the debris of the Armour & Co., smoke house and sewage plant, where an explosion yesterday brought death to at least 14, and property damage estimated at \$450,000. His head and shoulders were uncovered an hour after he was found and workers expected to extricate him before morning.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 9.—(AP)—With 14 known dead and three missing and believed to have been killed, three distinct investigations were projected tonight to attend to learn the cause of the explosion at the Armour & Co., packing plant here late yesterday. A coroners jury was summoned to conduct an inquest into the deaths of the blast victims, a citizens committee of mechanical and chemical experts was named to investigate the physical properties of the packing plant, and a private investigation will be undertaken by officials of Armour & Co.

The citizens committee was formed after W. E. Renfro, general manager of the packing plant, and Leo Urbanski, local fire chief, had expressed the belief that natural gas caused the explosion.

The governor's record is sketched briefly in the chamber bulletin announcing his address. Norblad came to America from Sweden at the age of seven years. His work has included such jobs as newsboy, foundry helper, salesman, band player. In 1902 Norblad graduated from the Chicago Law school.

For many years he served Clatsop county in various public offices including those of district attorney, city attorney and state senator.
