Guy Smith running against Judge L. H. McMahon for the circuit post has been hard at work for a month but McMahon, according to downtown reports Saturday is decidedly ahead unless some radical upset comes within the week.

This race for the state senators' posts in Marion county is to be close. Reynolds and Brown as incumbents, have a certain advantage in conservative Marion county. Dr. Riley of Hubbard, however, is exceedingly well known and an able campaigner while Settlemeier at Woodburn, several terms in the house and of pioneer stock, is in no sense a neophyte. Upsets may occur here.

For representative, with four places to be filled and 12 men in the race, no certainty of nomination exists for anyone unless it be several of the incumbents who feel their names and their records will assure victory.

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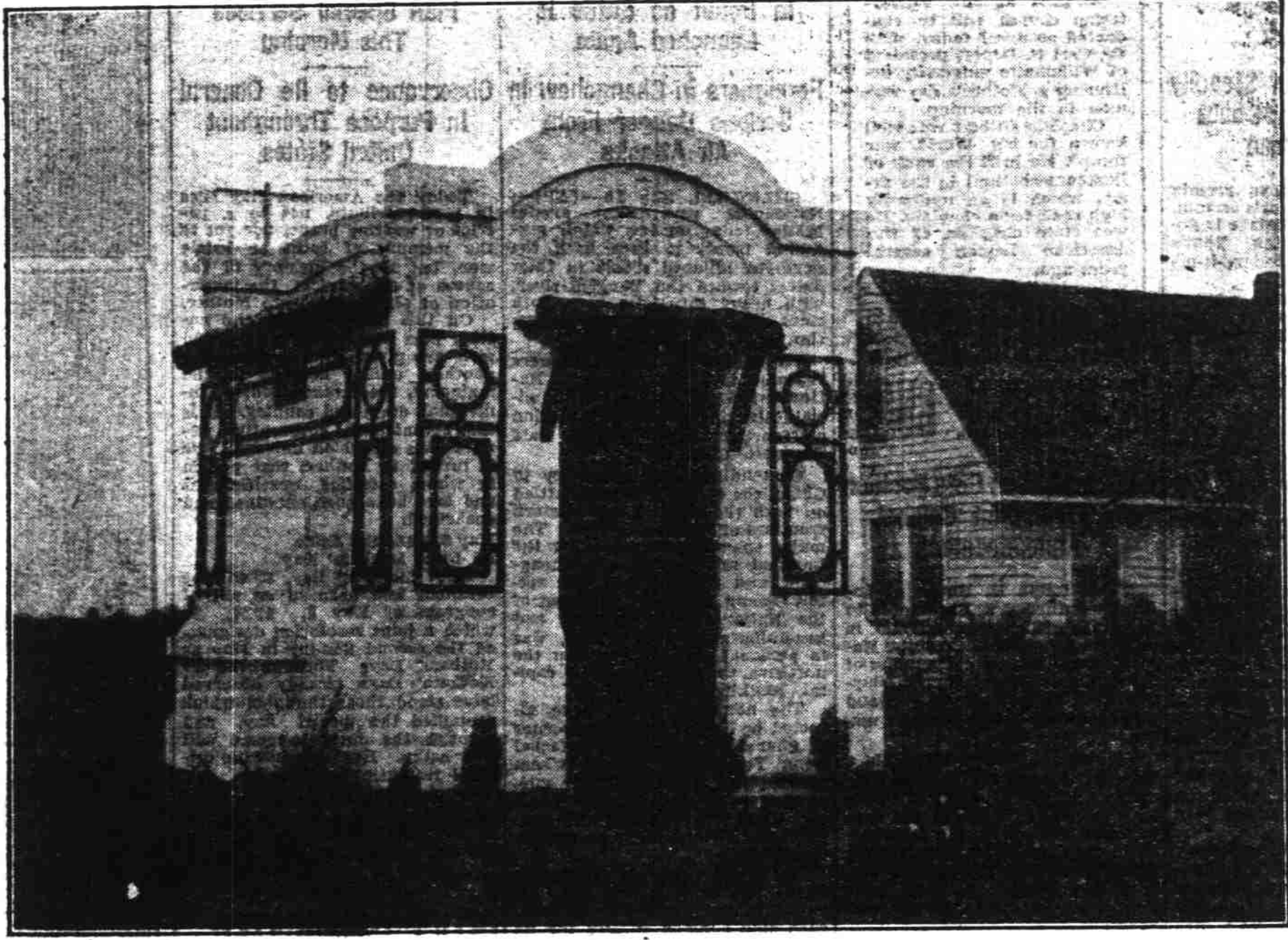
