1000 People Enjoy Musical Program on Sunday Evening

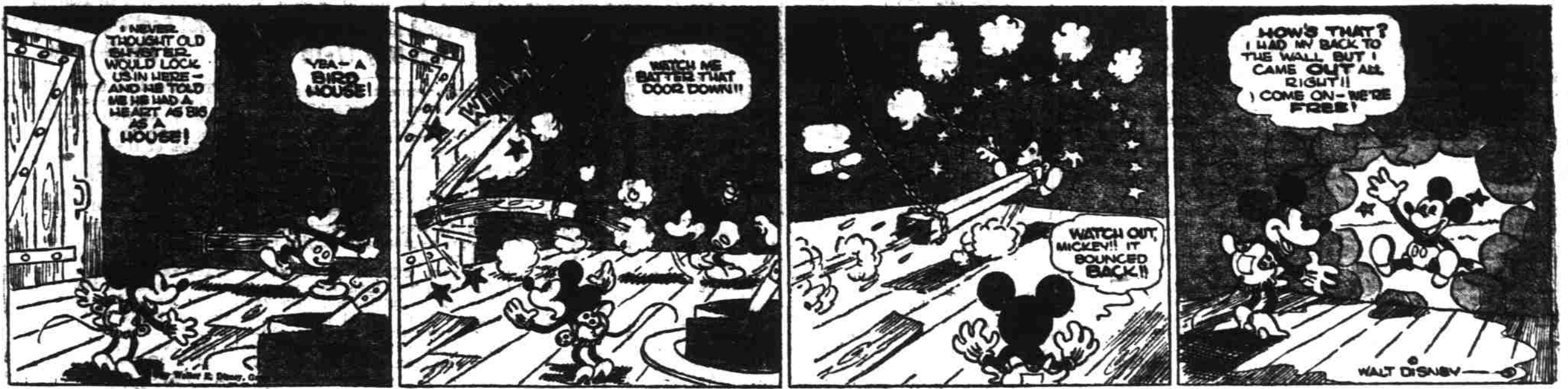

School Children Enjoy Picnic

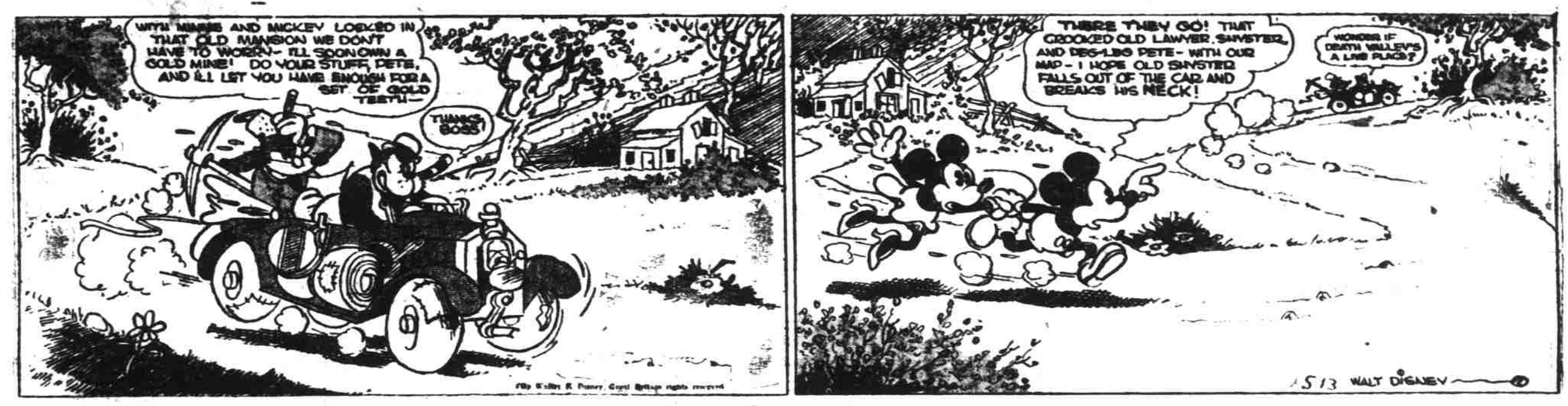

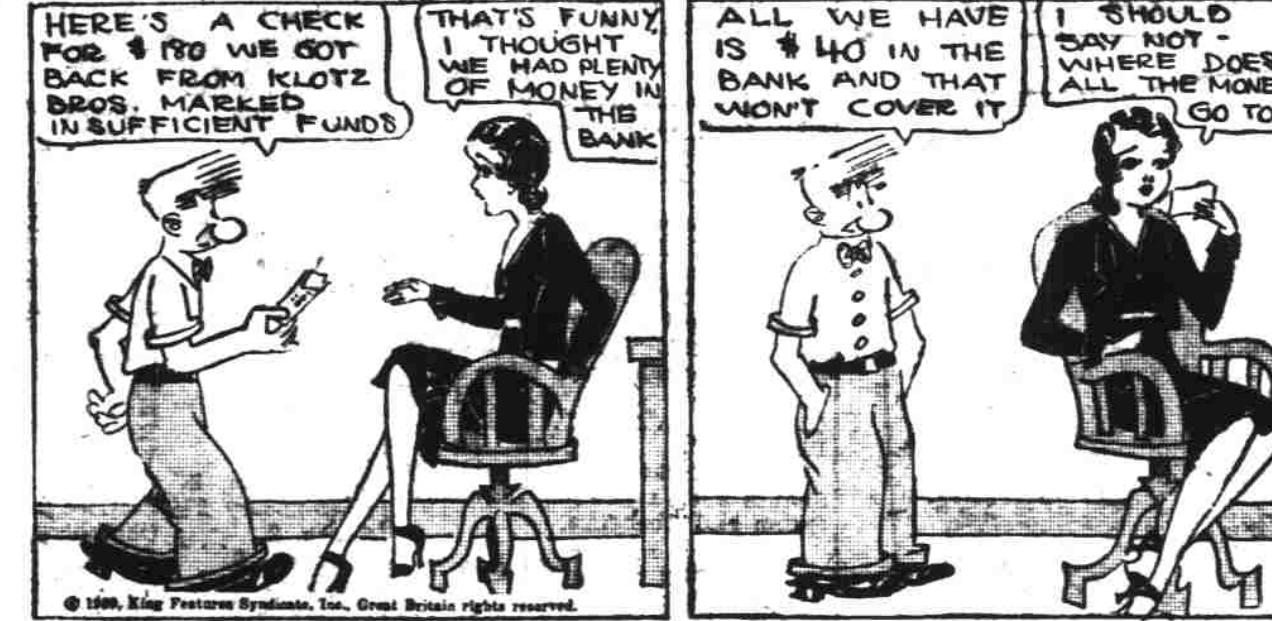

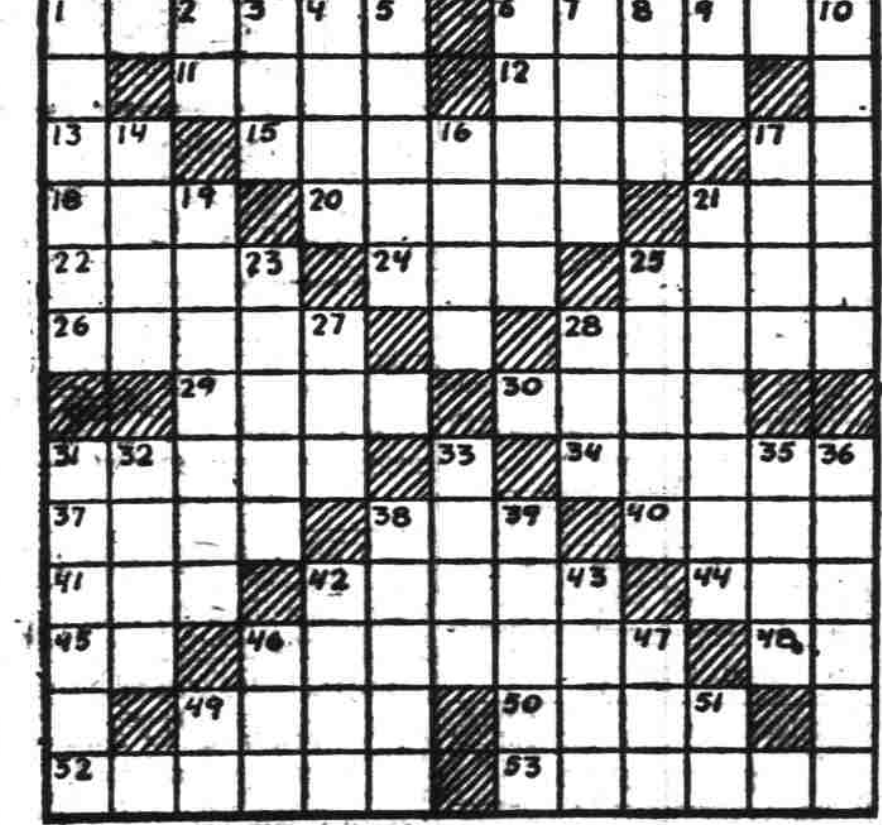
