Mrs. Clare F. Bodyfield, census enumerator for Cloverdale, Union and Hebo precincts, in Tillamook county, has finished her work and sent in her schedules. Her most difficult territory was in the Hebo precinct. On Saturday, May 10, the day she finished, she walked six miles to get to one family, and the day before she drove 10 miles to get the farm schedule of one man who was in the hospital when she was making his neighborhood.

She writes: "Owing to the orders regarding the Siuslaw national park, I have had a terrible time getting things in order. . . . So many farms are partly in the reserve; one farm is in the next out, so I cannot keep my sheets consecutively. . . . I put in plenty of time, as much as 12 to 14 hours a day; also worked Sundays. One Sunday I walked 13 miles in a terrible storm. Simply no roads for a car or even a horse-drawn conveyance. I think I have gotten every family in the three precincts."
