ARCHERY TOURNEY HELD AT MONMOUTH

MONMOUTH, May 15—(Special)—The Alibi Archers' club of Monmouth is sponsoring a state invitational archery tournament to be held here Saturday, May 24, to which all who are interested in archery are invited.

Registration for the events will be held at 9 o'clock a.m. on the archery grounds and the team shoot for men will begin promptly at 9:30. L. L. Dally, instructor of archery at the Oregon Normal school, and president of the Alibi Archers' organization, says he expects keen competition on the flight event for men since a number of men over the state have reported individual records this spring of 380 to 400 yards, which exceed the national record made by Dr. George A. Cathay of Portland at the Santa Barbara national tournament last summer. The men's division will include entries in the team, clout and flight shoot; and York round, the boys' division: the clout, flight and junior American round. The student division will permit students from both men and women to enter the other divisions under their own classification. Gold and silver medals will be awarded as trophies for first and second place winners in the men's and women's divisions; and a special silver cup trophy for the first place winners for men and women in the student division. Two silver cups will be awarded for first places in flight events for men and women; one of these trophies being the A. E. Coleman cup for women. An innovation will be featured in the Novice classification, for those who have never before participated in a tournament, and Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Frost of Moscow, Idaho are offering special prizes for entrant winners. Many commercial awards will be presented to the winners of the various other events.

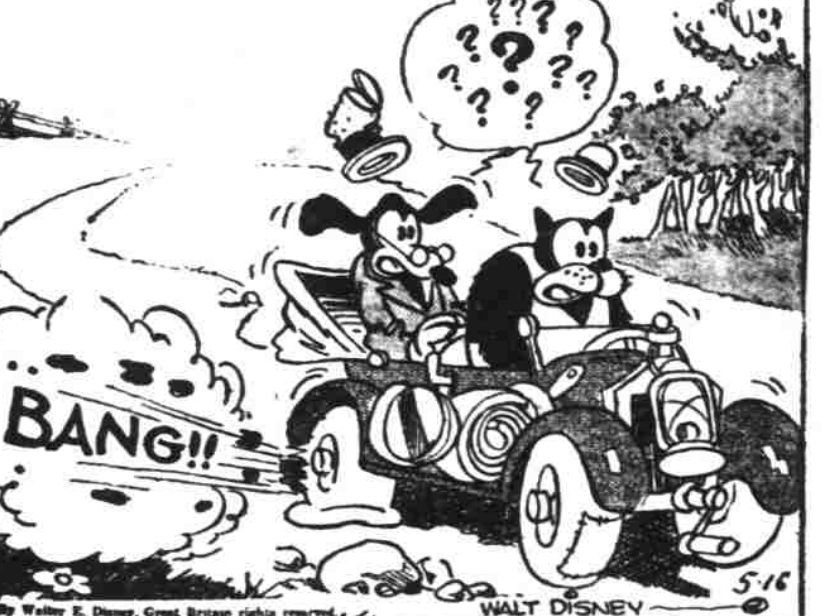
Future Farm Workers Put On Assembly

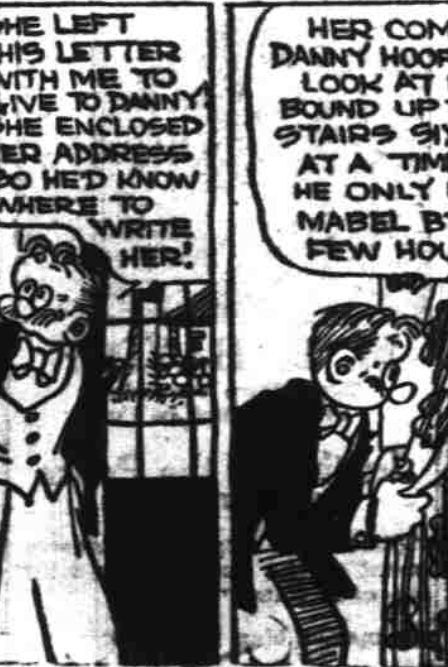
