On May 16, 1930, the voters of Salen will be asked to vote "IES" of "NO" on the question of whether the charter is to be amended to call for a \$1,200,000.00 bond issue to purchase the local

water plant.

It involves adding to the bonded indebtedness of Salem upwards of \$1,200,000.00 which, if not met out of operating revenue, becomes a direct obligation on the taxpayer.

The Oregon-Washington Water Service Company is now expending approximately \$300,000.00 for improvements which should assure an adequate supply of good water, which has long been badly needed. These improvements are vitally essential to the health and general welfare of the people of Sales. The present owner of the water system we believe has undertaken this work in good faith and we feel it only fair that it should be permitted to finish unmolested the work it has undertaken. Moreover, we feel we should see the new system in operation and have an opportunity

to fairly judge the type of water furnished and service rendered the people before being called upon to vote upon the problem now under consideration The question is always open, and we can go into the water business at any time, but it is our belief that sufficient study and investigation have not been made to undertake so important a step at In our opinion, we should vote "NO" on the bond issue as proposed in the charter amendment.
