Francis Shunk Brown Trailing by Slightly More Than 5000 Votes

Secretary Davis Continues To Pile up Advantage Over Mr. Grundy

PHILADELPHIA, May 21. -(AP) -Gifford Pinchot increased his lead over Francis Shunk Brown for the republican nomination for governor to 5,090 on the unofficial returns from 8,399 districts of the state's 8751.

The vote for governor from the 8,399 districts was, Brown 604,-945, Pinchot 610,935, and Thomas W. Phillips, wet, 259,755.

Returns from 8,234 districts for senator, gave Grundy 473,013, Secretary Davis 712,637 and Professor Nohlen, wet candidate, 233,-

Making further concessions to he house, the senate conference agreed to eliminate the duty of 30 cents an ounce on silver and the amendment permitting free entry of cement for state and municipal public works, leaving stand a rate of six cents per 166 pounds on all cement.

The house managers receded and allowed a rate of \$1 per 1,fir, spruce, pine, hemlock and larch lumber despite defeat recently on the house floor of a levy of 75 cents on these antiwoods. The senate bill carried a rate of \$1.50 per thousand feet Part of Measure Not Accepted

The house group would not eccept that part of the lumber amendment applying the duty to railroad ties and telephone and telegraph poles of all kinds of wood and this section was eliminated.
