

Black Snow Nuisance Attacked in Circuit Court Action

INJUNCTION IS BEING SOUGHT

Detrimental Effect of Cinders Told in Complaint Filed Yesterday

No less than nine specific damages from cinders from the mill of the Oregon Pulp and Paper company are set forth in the complaint filed by W. C. Winslow against that company Thursday in circuit court.

Winslow asks a court injunction compelling the mill "from continuing the nuisance described in the complaint."

Winslow judges the complaint in the name of the State of Oregon, claiming his rights as a citizen are being hampered. John A. Carson as district attorney, joins in signing the complaint.

The local attorney, in seeking the injunction, goes into two-page detail in the recitation of injuries to himself and others alleged to be caused by cinders from the mill.

He claims the cinders mar the appearance of buildings and sitting in store rooms, destroy some merchandise. He claims they clog drains. These self-same cinders, reads the statement of the complainant, filter into law offices and make dirty and obnoxious certain legal documents.

Car upholstery in automobiles is injured by cinders, the complaint recites, and in addition streets in Salem are besmirched and lobbies in hotels and public buildings are made unclean. Table linen in restaurants is affected by the obnoxious cinder. Winslow declares and personal appearance of individuals is marred. Cinders "lodge in people's eyes, mouths and ears," says Winslow, who goes on to say this fact "causes extreme pain." The complaint against the cinder ends with a general allegation that the omnipresent pest "is a general public nuisance."

DANGEROUS BLAZE PUT UNDER CONTROL

PERTH AMBOY, N. J., May 22. (AP)—Fire that started on a gasoline loaded lighter at the docks of the Shell Ethel Products Co., Seward, three miles from here, tonight was quickly brought under control. Prompt action prevented spread of flames to a nearby tanker and to gasoline storage tanks.

The lighter Riley and Kindall was destroyed by the fire which followed an explosion. First reports said the fire was threatening the entire plant and officials, recalling the recent fire which did \$3,000,000 damage at the Gulf Oil Co. refinery in Bayonne, summoned apparatus from Seward, Woodbridge and Perth Amboy.

PLANS FIXED FOR BUILDING

Architect Completes Work On New Medical and Dental Structure

ticipants in the enterprise. Rosten added that he did not feel the proposed structure would harm existing tenants. He said he felt sure that the growth of Salem within the next few years would make the structure fill a need now being felt for additional high-grade modern office space.

According to the plans prepared by Knighton and Howell, Portland architects, the structure would cover an area of 104 feet on North Commercial street and 165 feet on State street.

The plans call for a Class A, steel frame, fireproof, strictly modern building, with every room having an outside exposure. The tower would have a steel frame throughout, permitting readjustment of office sizes to fill any need.

Facing of the new building would be in terra cotta, similar to that recently used in the new telephone building here.

"We have called for plans to provide a structure far in advance of anything now in Salem," Rosten said. "Our idea is to build for the future."

Rosten pointed out that this had been done with many innovations for office buildings in Salem. Virtually the entire basement of the new structure would be used for a garage for tenants and patients, with storage capacity for 125 cars. Complete servicing of cars would be provided here so professional men could readily have their cars kept in excellent shape.

Three elevators are provided for, one of extra large size to permit use of stretchers for patients, or materials for alteration without interference of elevator service. This elevator would also be

run at slow speed for the convenience of patients. The third floor will contain a library, lecture room and dining room. Part of the roof of the second floor will be used as a roof garden. On the tenth floor an emergency hospital would be built and its use afforded to every doctor and dentist in the building.

Rosten indicated that numerous requests for accommodations had already been received and that some larger firms had requested a number of rooms in one suite. He indicated that business interests along Commercial and State streets had responded favorably to the project which is held to be a sound means of increasing property values along that district.

State Will Sue U. S. Government For Land Title

Attorney General Van Winkle Thursday received information that Congress has passed the act authorizing the state of Oregon to bring suit against the federal government in an effort to establish the state's claim to the lands in the beds of Malheur lake and Harney lake. This land is now claimed by the federal government under the Roosevelt Bird Reserve act. The state of Oregon claims the land as being the bed of navigable streams. Much of the land is also claimed by riparian owners. Thousands of acres, much of it valuable hay land, is said to be involved in the controversy which it is hoped to be able to settle in the courts.

NEW POLICY HELD HELP TO FARMERS

The use of electricity by residents of suburban districts will be greatly encouraged, it is believed here, under the new extension policy promulgated by the public service commission Thursday and made effective after June 15.

This new policy on which the commission has been at work for several months is designed to reduce the burden of the extension cost to the consumer. It requires the utility to make extensions free of all cost to the consumer when the cost of such extension does not exceed \$75 per customer. In the event the estimated cost should exceed this amount the customer is given two options: first, that of paying to the company the difference between the free investment and the estimated cost, or secondly, the payment of this difference in cost through what is referred to as a "minimum monthly revenue," over a period of five years after construction of such an extension would be required to pay their pro rata share of the cost of such extension.

The \$75 free investment, it is set out in the order of the commission, represents three times the estimated annual revenue of

the company from such service. In no event would any utility be required to make such a service extension when the cost per customer exceeds six times the estimated annual revenue.

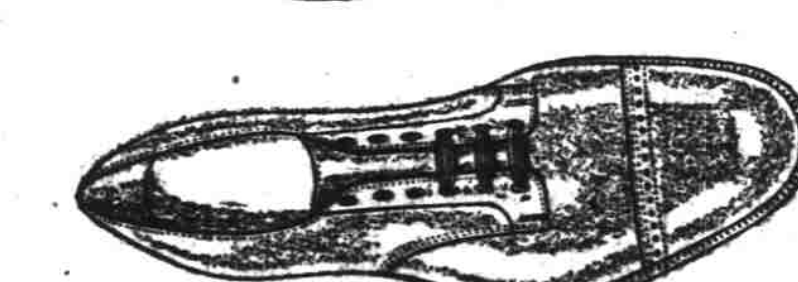
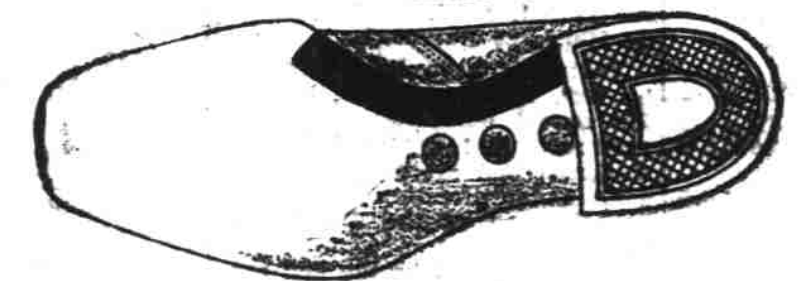
