

FARM PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED

Silverton Chamber of Commerce Hold Regular Dinner Meeting

SILVERTON, May 22—A fourth of July celebration, sponsored by the local fire department and American Legion, was endorsed at the Silverton chamber of commerce dinner held Wednesday evening at the armory. The dinner was served by the women of St. Paul's church.

A report written by Alf O. Nelson was read. The report was from the meeting which Mr. Nelson attended at the Brush Creek school at the last meeting of the Brush Creek Booster club. The report said that this community had two complaints to make to the chamber of commerce. The one was concerning the great amount of mosquitoes which, presumably, originated in the ponds of Silverton's lumber mills. The other complaint was of the city sewage which was emptied into Silver Creek. Silver Creek flows through a portion of the Brush Creek district.

Mayor Eastman said that, while this latter situation might cause some discomfort to the residents of the Brush Creek district, he was of the opinion that no sanitation laws were violated and that it would cost \$75,000 to remedy the matter. Mayor Eastman volunteered to appear before the next meeting of the Booster club and explain the situation.

Others spoke on the mosquito situation. Dr. C. W. Keene, in speaking of the matter, said that mosquitoes did not come from the mill pond alone. He said that about the same time as the Silver Falls mill came into Silverton people began a more intensive irrigation program and that we were facing the same problem that all irrigation sections were. Where there was dampness the mosquito population rapidly increased. Others reported that if old tin cans containing a little stagnant water were all removed a very good breeding ground of mosquitoes would also be destroyed.

Dr. C. W. Keene, Dr. A. J. McCannell, and Dr. P. A. Loar were instructed to write a group of articles to be published in the local papers to "educate the peevish mosquito-ology."

Rubbish Resented
Evans Valley representatives complained that citizens of Silverton were dumping rubbish at the roadsides in the country. Members of the chamber of commerce expressed their regret over this but said they could not be held

responsible. They also said that this dumping at roadsides was a state offense and that arrests would follow the discovery of anyone violating this law.

Pigeons Pick Prunes
Alfred Loe, also of the Evans Valley district, reported that the farmers in that neighborhood had been greatly bothered with wild pigeons which were under Oregon's protective game law. The pigeons, according to Mr. Loe, were stripping the prune orchards of their fruit. He reported that he had taken two of the pigeons to Portland to I. Gabrielson, who is in charge of the rodent control. One of these pigeons contained 20 prunes and the other 23 prunes. A special permit to shoot the pigeons had been issued but, said Mr. Loe, few of the farmers could afford to guard their orchards continuously. He asked that the legislative body of the chamber recommend that these pigeons be declared a nuisance and be placed under the rodent control ordinances.

A petition was passed asking that Rogue River be closed to commercial salmon and steelhead fishing and many signatures were received during the evening.

Norris Ames, president of the chamber, reported that the dairy committee was making investigations and would report back to the chamber before long.

D. E. Gelsler spoke on the advertising of Silver Creek Falls as an asset to Silverton, bringing tourists through the town. The matter of the chamber paying for an advertisement of the Falls of country was left in the hands of the executive committee. The matter of opening an employment agency was also discussed and this was left in the hands of the executive committee.

The Silverton community orchestra, which has been furnishing music to community affairs, appealed for financial aid from the chamber of commerce. E. B. Kottek suggested that the matter be taken up by the city council. He said that usually city councils gave such organizations some support. The matter was finally left in the hands of a committee composed of Otto Legard, Julius Alm and L. C. Eastman.

Mr. Ames announced that a poultry meeting was being arranged for the near future.

Music for the evening was furnished by Mrs. W. F. Tate, vocal soloist, with Hal Campbell at the piano; by Beryl Ottaway, violinist, with Mrs. Lowell Davenport at the piano; and by Mr. McNamara, a representative of the P. E. P. company of Salem, who gave a number of piano solos.

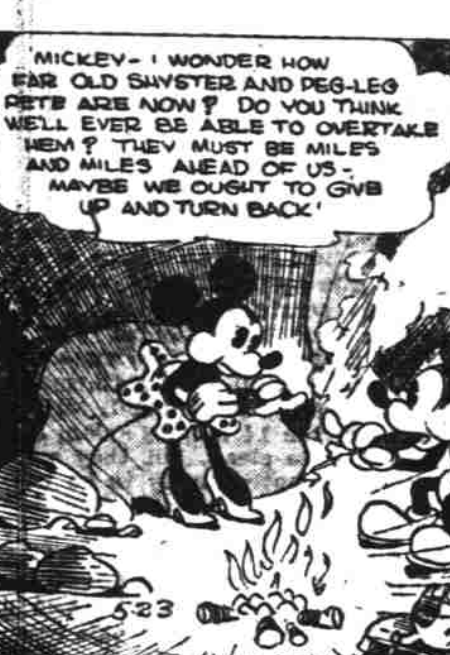
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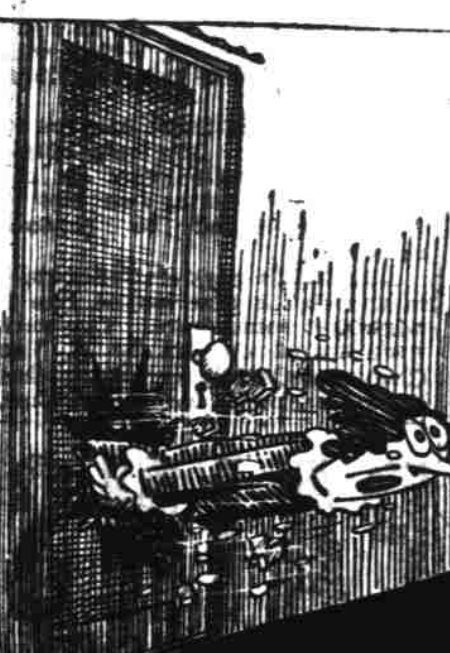

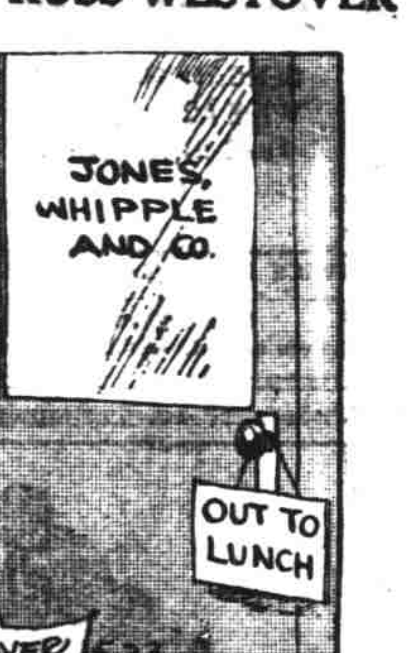
