

Five Changes Effected In Willamette University Faculty

NEW PROFS TO BE HIRED HERE

Leaves of Absence and New Jobs Leave Vacancies In Local Staff

Five changes have been listed so far in the faculty of the school of liberal arts at Willamette university, according to Carl Gregg Doney, president. The instructors in the law school and school of music remain unchanged.

Professor W. E. Kirk, ancient language instructor, and Alda Galy Curry, of the physical education department, have obtained leaves of absence for study next year. Echo Baldersee of the high school faculty has been placed in Miss Curry's position, but no successor for either Kirk, or Charles M. Sherman, professor of psychology, who has a leave of absence, has been secured.

F. D. Leamer, instructor in physics, is leaving this summer to accept a position with the Bell laboratories in New York City, and his place will be taken by Earl T. Brown, who taught here several years ago. The position of registrar which has been filled by Mrs. Leamer, will be taken by Earl M. Tennant, former registrar at Oregon State college. In the department of religion Daniel H. Shulze, graduate of the University of Chicago, has been secured to fill the vacancy left by Dr. J. D. McCormick.

Blanks Sent Out For Autoists to Obtain Licenses

Application blanks for the new 1936-37 motor vehicle license plates which must be obtained before July 1, have been placed in the mail. There are approximately 200,000 cars subject to license in the state at the present time. The 1929 legislature changed the law so that license must be obtained prior to July 1 instead of prior to January 1, as under the previous enactment. There is a slight reduction in the license fee under the new law. Administration of the motor vehicle license law is under the secretary of state.

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LIQUOR BUYER IS NOT LIABLE

Rum Can Be Purchased With Immunity Declares High U. S. Tribunal

Suggesting that congress may have considered it more important to make the purchaser available as a witness against the bootlegger, the court added it had failed to enact any specific legislation making the purchase of liquor illegal.

Asserting the government for many years had not considered the purchaser guilty, the justice concluded congress in enacting the Volstead act had "deliberately and decisively omitted to impose upon the purchaser of liquor for beverage purposes any criminal liability."

The second case was that of Alfred E. Norris, New York banker, who was indicted for conspiracy with a Philadelphia bootlegger from whom he frequently ordered liquor. When arraigned he entered a plea of "nolo contendere" intending to contest the question.

He sought to attack the judgment entered by the federal district court at Philadelphia and was sustained by the circuit court of appeals, which took the broad ground that the purchase of liquor was no offense under the law. The supreme court in an opinion by Sutherland, held the plea was equivalent to one of "guilty" and that the trial court had properly sentenced Norris. Under these circumstances it found there was no question upon which would require it to rule whether the purchaser who orders knowing that illegal transportation was involved was guilty of conspiracy.

Its action left that question for decision when a case can be found which presents the controversy in a form permitting a ruling on its merits.
