

CORRIGAN OUT OF GAME BODY

Norblad Ousts Commissioner and Appoints Eugene's Candidate

Removal of M. F. Corrigan of Medford as a member of the state game commission and appointment of David Evans of Eugene as his successor, were announced by Governor Norblad Wednesday. Corrigan's term would have expired in 1932.

Governor Norblad said the change was not intended as a reflection against Corrigan, but was necessitated in order to readjust the geographical location of members of the commission. Norblad said that at present the entire territory of western Oregon from Yamhill to Josephine county had no representation on the commission, and that Corrigan and J. E. Cullison of Portland were from adjoining counties.

Although not ready to make any definite announcement the governor intimated that there might be a change in the eastern Oregon personnel of the commission. The eastern Oregon members of the commission are M. A. Wright of Union county and L. A. Lynch of Redmond. Such a change could be brought about by the appointment of Lynch as a member of the state highway commission to succeed Robert W. Sawyer of Bend.

In discussing the eastern Oregon situation Governor Norblad said that the Klamath Falls district, which is one of the most heavily populated east of the Cascade mountains, had no representation on the commission. This statement on the part of Governor Norblad indicates that in case Mr. Lynch is appointed a member of the state highway commission a Klamath county man will be appointed as his successor on the state game commission.

Mr. Evans, the newly appointed game commissioner, is an attorney and is a member of the firm of Imml and Evans. The former member of the firm is president of the Oregon state bar association.

The personnel of the game commission as now constituted includes Mr. Evans of Eugene, Mr. Lynch of Redmond, L. A. Wright of La Grange, J. E. Cullison of Portland and Wilfred Allen of Grants Pass.

Runners that a change is to be made in the personnel of the state highway commission within the next few days were given credence here Wednesday when C. E. (Pop) Gates of Medford, a member of the commission, spent more than an hour conferring with Governor Norblad.

Friends of Governor Norblad declared yesterday that the change in the personnel of the game commission was not unexpected by Mr. Corrigan, who was called to Salem a few days ago by the executive.

Governor Norblad also announced the appointment of E. W. Barnhart of Independence as district attorney of Polk county to succeed W. W. Harcombe of Dallas who has resigned effective June 1. Barnhart is the republican nominee for the office. Harcombe's resignation has been in the hands of Governor Norblad for several weeks.

W. Lair Thompson, Portland attorney, has been reappointed by Governor Norblad as a member of the state library board. Thompson has been a member of the library board for several years.

Announcement also was made of the appointment of Charles Stephens of Wheeler as justice of the peace of District No. 1 of Tillamook county, to succeed G. B. Dunn, who is to leave the state.

LABORITES IN FAVOR OF MOIST STATUTES

HANNIBAL, Mo., May 23 (AP)—Declaring for modification of the Volstead law to permit manufacture of 3.75 per cent beer and favoring the full pardon of Tom Mooney, convicted of a San Francisco bombing, the 19th annual convention of the Missouri state federation of labor concluded its second day's session of its convention here today.

The prohibition resolution was adopted after a debate in which the issue was whether it should be made a demand for outright repeal of the dry law. The resolution was a compromise of five proposals.

Opening with a statement that failure of the Volstead law was "best indicated by the national Literary Digest poll" the resolution continued with a statement that the "drastic provisions of the Jones law, have aroused the people into action such as no other federal law has ever done and efforts to enforce it at vast public expense have utterly failed to secure for it respect and obedience."

Then it calls attention to the letter of William Green, to President Hoover and Chairman Wickard of the law enforcement commission in which the labor official in February "clearly pointed out the economic value of modification of the Volstead law to permit the manufacture, sale and distribution of wholesome beer containing 3.75 per cent alcohol by weight."

BROTHER OF GEORGE PUTNAM DIES, PARIS

Arthur Putnam, California sculptor and brother of George Putnam, editor and publisher of the Salem Capital Journal, died in Paris late Tuesday, according to a cablegram received here. His mother, Mrs. Mary M. Putnam of Salem died two weeks ago.

Mrs. Putnam was born at Waverland, Miss., in 1873. He was educated in the public schools at Omaha and Kemper Hall, Davenport, Iowa, and located in California in 1892.

Putnam's first work to attract attention was a series of California historical characters for the late E. W. Scripps, newspaper publisher for the latter's estate at Miramar. He lost most of his earlier work in the San Francisco earthquake.

Mr. Putnam was awarded the gold medal at the San Francisco exposition and was best known for animal sculpture. Collections of his work were presented to the Palace of the Legion of Honor at San Francisco and San Diego by Mrs. Alma de B. Spreckles.

Surviving are his widow, a daughter, Mrs. M. E. V. (Bruce) Putnam Howe of New Orleans, a son, George Storey Putnam of Oakland, Calif., and a brother and sister, George and Elizabeth of Salem.

HEARING SLATED TO VAN TRUMP'S CASE

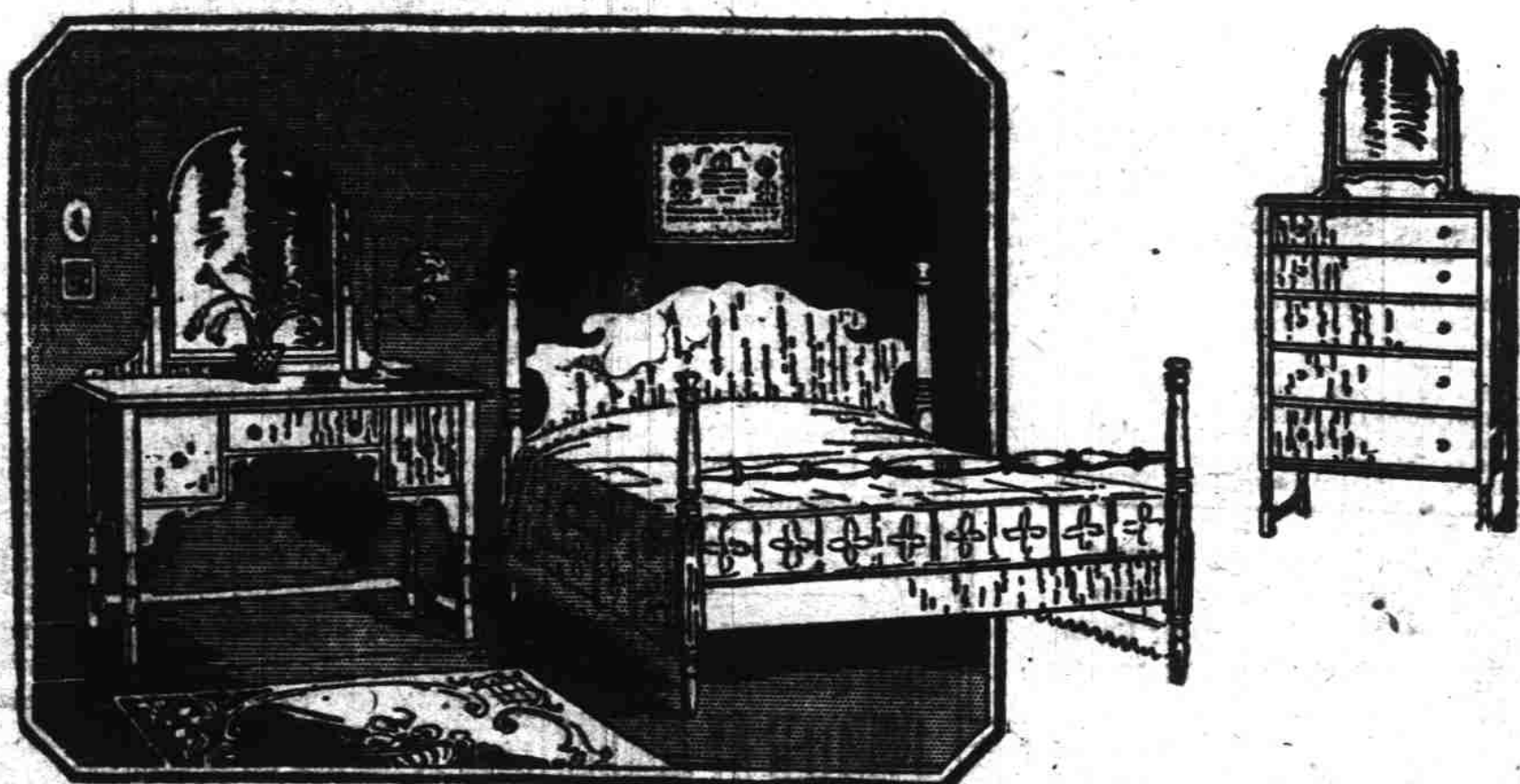

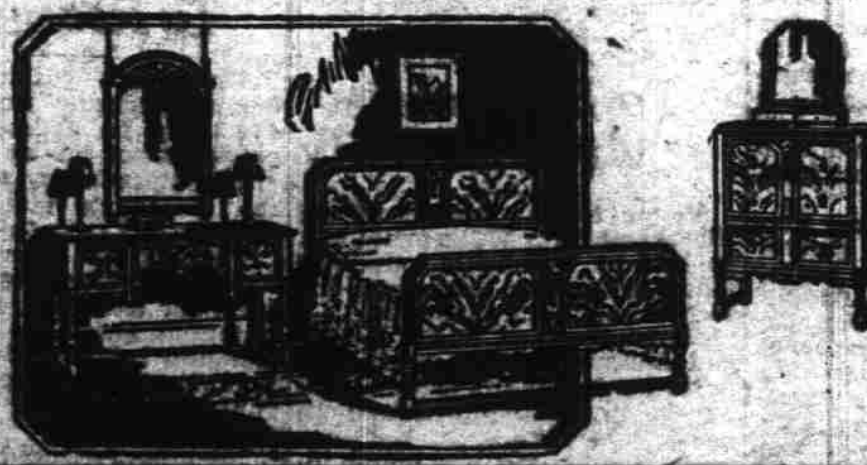
