LOCALS WIN IN FINAL INNING

Late Rally Brings Solons From Behind to Nose Out Victory

Providence smiled on the Salem Senators Friday afternoon and enabled them to win the third successive Memorial day ball game from the Montavilla team of Portland, 8 to 7. Johnny Harkins, Villan pitcher, was weakening rapidly and the Senators might have won anyway, but a train load of horsehoes saved the effort. It was a real hitting contest, but nevertheless close at all times with the lead shifting almost every half inning. Harkins and Towne, the latter "Frisco" Edwards' choice to start the game, were both hit hard, but only two of Salem's runs were earned.

The big thrill came in the last half of the ninth, which opened with Salem two runs behind. Kermit Russell made two wild stabs at the ball but the third pitch hit him and he drew a free base.
