Funeral Planned—Funeral services for Mrs. Arletta M. Page, who died Friday afternoon, will be held Monday at 3 p. m. from the Rigdon chapel, with Dr. W. C. Kantner officiating. Burial will be in Belcrest Memorial park. The urn containing the ashes of her husband, who died at their home in Seattle nearly 16 years ago, will be shipped here from Seattle and buried beside Mrs. Page's remains.

CENSUS WORK FINISHED SOON

Count In This District to Be Completed by Middle of June

Prospects are that all work on the census in this district will be cleaned up by the middle of June, it was indicated yesterday by Supervisor R. J. Hendricks. First voucher of Salem enumerators is now under way and everything is being closed up here as fast as possible. The Salem population had reached 26,184 yesterday.

Tillamook county's check has been completed, Yamhill's is now being closed up and the Polk and Marion schedules will be inspected and shipped in order. In the meantime, all new names of people who know themselves to have been missed in the census will be taken. These will be received even after the schedules have been sent to Washington and will be mailed as soon as received.

Supervisor Hendricks says of 100 hobos and transients he interviewed the other night, only six had not been enumerated. Most of them claimed to have been counted in Portland.

Hendricks says he is bending every effort to get as many names as possible that belong here, inasmuch as a few names more or less may mean the difference between losing or gaining a congressman for Oregon in the redistricting of representatives.

Doctors to Meet—The regular monthly dinner meeting of the Marion-Yamhill-Polk Medical society will be held Tuesday night at the Elk's temple, beginning at 7 o'clock. Dr. Wilson Johnston of Portland will read a paper on "Sudden Loss of Vision," this question to be discussed by Dr. M. C. Findley of Salem. Dr. George Vehr will read a paper on "Anesthesia, its Principles in Practice," and discussion will be led by Dr. Laban Steves.

U. meeting Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Union hall at the corner of Ferry and South Commercial street. Damages of \$2461 were awarded Linnie Hill in her auto accident case against K. H. Harritt, in a circuit court verdict Saturday. Sethe Hawk was assigned no part in the damage indictment. Miss Hill asked for \$10,136 damages in her suit. The jury was out one hour and one-half.

Immediately trial of a second case against Harritt and Hawk got under way, J. E. Hill, being plaintiff. He asks for \$2413 damages.

The accident took place the night of December 31, 1930. The Hill car, coming toward Salem met the autos driven by Hawk and Harritt. The Hawk car, ahead of the Harritt car, was struck by the latter machine and ricocheted into the Hill car. The defendants varied in their theory of the blame Harritt claiming Hawk had no tail light on his machine.
