JEFFERSON HAS STORE ROBBERY

B. S. Thurston and Sons Visited by Thieves on Monday Morning

JEFFERSON, June 2.—Between two and three o'clock Monday morning three robbers entered the store of B. S. Thurston and Sons of Jefferson by breaking the glass of the front door with a wrench. The wrench was found lying inside the building by the door.

George C. Mason, druggist, who resides opposite the store building, was awakened and saw two cars parked in front of the store; saw three robbers carrying out goods to the cars. Mason telephoned to B. S. Thurston. The telephone of the store and residence being on the same line, the robbers were evidently frightened as they were gone before Thurston got to the store, being only a block away.

The stolen goods consisted of six cartons of cigarettes, tobacco, overalls, candy and gum; the exact amount is not known. Some of the stolen goods was reported to have been found in Albany. As yet no reports have been received as to their being caught.
