Miss Helen McMillan spent the weekend in Portland with her parents. She returned Monday morning.

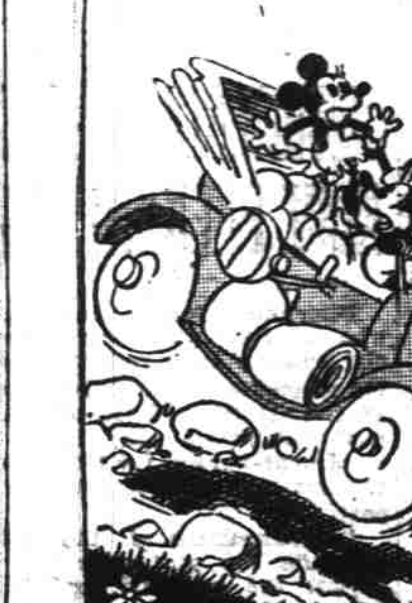

Dr. James G. Needham, professor of entomology at Cornell, has been awarded the King senior memorial medal by the Peaking Society of Natural History.

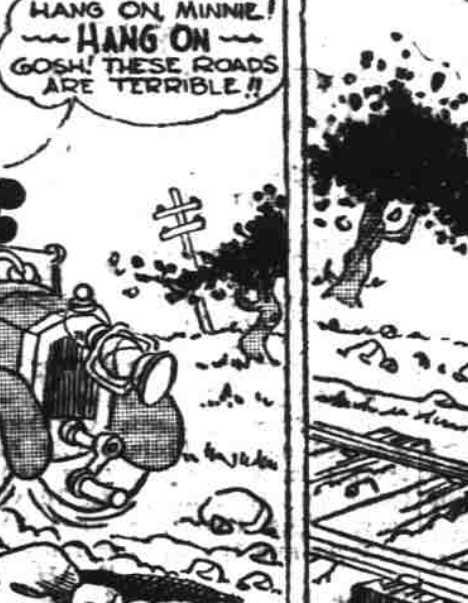
RIVER USE FAVORED

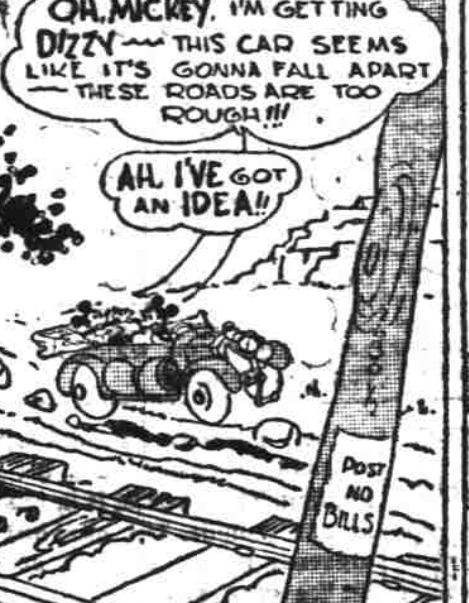

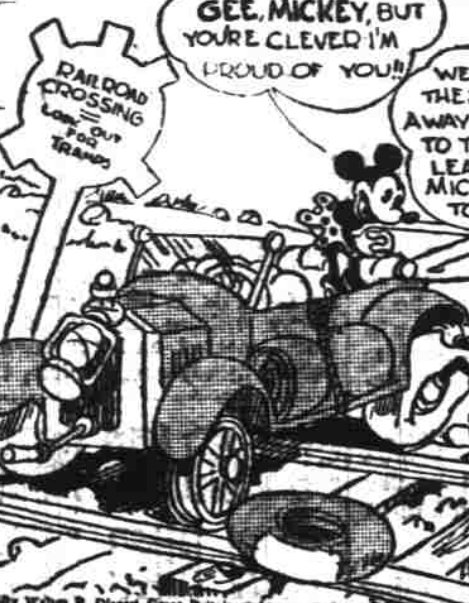

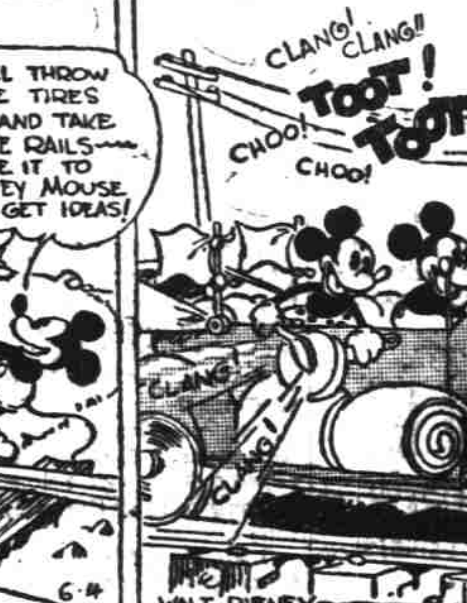
