

# Ninety on Firing Line as State Trapshoot Opens In Salem

## SCORES HIGH ON FIRST DAY

### Frank Troeh Wins Class A 16-Yard Shoot; Many Trophies Awarded

Ninety shotgun experts were on the mark when the Oregon state trapshoot opened officially Friday morning and many more are expected in the remaining two days of the annual event, which is being held on the grounds of the Salem Trapshooters' club.

Frank M. Troeh of Portland won the class A trophy in the 100-bird 16 yard event Friday, with a score of 98. C. L. Moore of Klamath Falls won in class B with 98; C. H. Woodcock of Corvallis in class D with 99 and W. H. Beckman in class D with 96.

G. W. Houston of Klamath Falls won the J. C. Morris trophy and the Carl Bahburg trophy in the handicap shoot with a score of 95; E. C. Griffin of Seattle won the R. E. DeWesse trophy at 94; H. E. Thornton of Marshfield won the Hartman trophy with 95 and George Burkholder of Hillsboro won the C. J. Bartlett trophy with 95.

**Competition Close For Preston Trophy**

The first event was divided between J. A. Thompson of Hlodegett, E. C. Griffin of Seattle, C. H. Woodcock of Corvallis, G. W. Houston of Klamath Falls and H. E. Thornton of Marshfield. George Burkholder of Hillsboro won the second event for the first time in the state championship, and will also be the shootoff in the state telegraphic shoot for teams which qualified. There will also be 100 birds handicap for trophies, and 25 pairs for the state doubles championship.

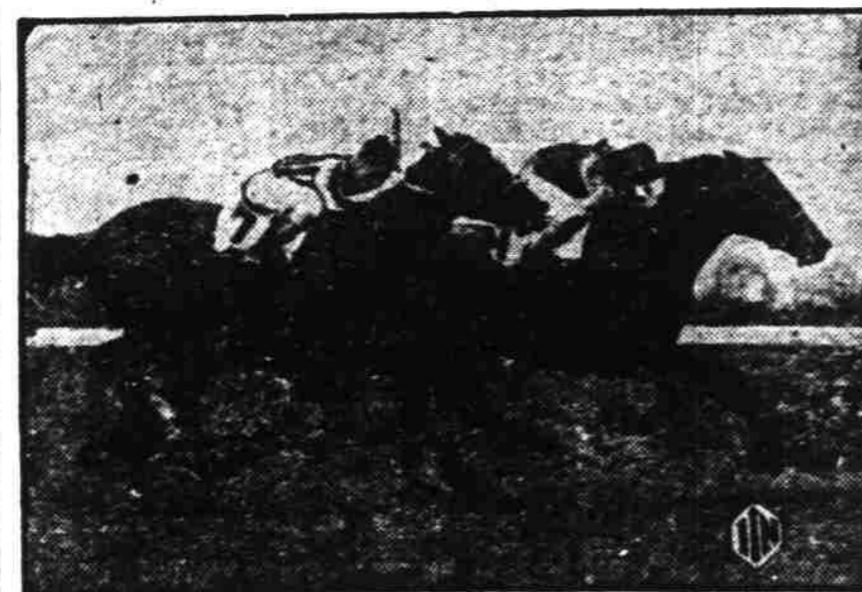

## Southern Cal Track Stars Dominate Preliminaries At National Collegiates

CHICAGO, June 6.—(AP)—A glittering band of athletes from the University of Southern California braved the danger of pneumonia today to make their bid for track and field supremacy in competition with 125 of the greatest stars in America.

The Trojans, already victorious in the eastern intercollegiate and Pacific coast championship, ran in a cold, drizzly rain and sifting wind that swept Stagg field this afternoon, overwhelmingly to place 12 athletes in line of ten preliminaries of the national collegiate athletic association championship meet. As a result of their performance in the trials, the Trojans will enter the finals tomorrow heavy favorites to beat off challenges of Ohio State, Washington and Illinois.

**Discarding the controversial starting blocks which caused the international amateur athletic federation to throw out his world record performance of 9.4 for the 100 yard dash, George Simpson, Ohio State, with Frank Wykoff of U. S. C., turned in the fastest time for the century trials.**

Each broke the tape in the heats in 9.6. The finals tomorrow will bring together the greatest field of sprinters in the nation, and Simpson is confident he will be the one to win. He also turned in the fastest time in the 220-yard dash winning in 21.4.

**Tolan, Bracey and Leland also qualified together with Farmer of North Carolina, Root and East of Chicago, and Wells of Iowa State.**

**"Beard" Athlete Leaps 25 Feet**

Lee Sentman, University of Illinois, led the qualifiers in the 120-yard high hurdles and 220-yard low event, and also edged into the final jump. He skimmed the highs in 14.6 for the fastest time of the day and repeated with a 23.8 performance in the low hurdles. Steve Anderson, Washington, furnished sentiment with stiff competition by running the lows in 23.9 and the highs in 14.8.

**Edward Gordon, negro star from University of Iowa, and defending champion in broad jump, who was reported thrown off the Hawkeye squad yesterday after a dispute with Coach George Bresnahan, competed today and led all qualifiers.**

After the team left Iowa City, Gordon dug into his own pocket for his fare and made his appearance when the meet opened. He was so infuriated because he had to pay the way he went right out and jumped 25 feet, the best leap of his life. Ed Hamm, of Georgia, today added the French amateur crown to his collection.
