William Rickman is confined to his home with a severe attack of tonsillitis and stomach trouble.

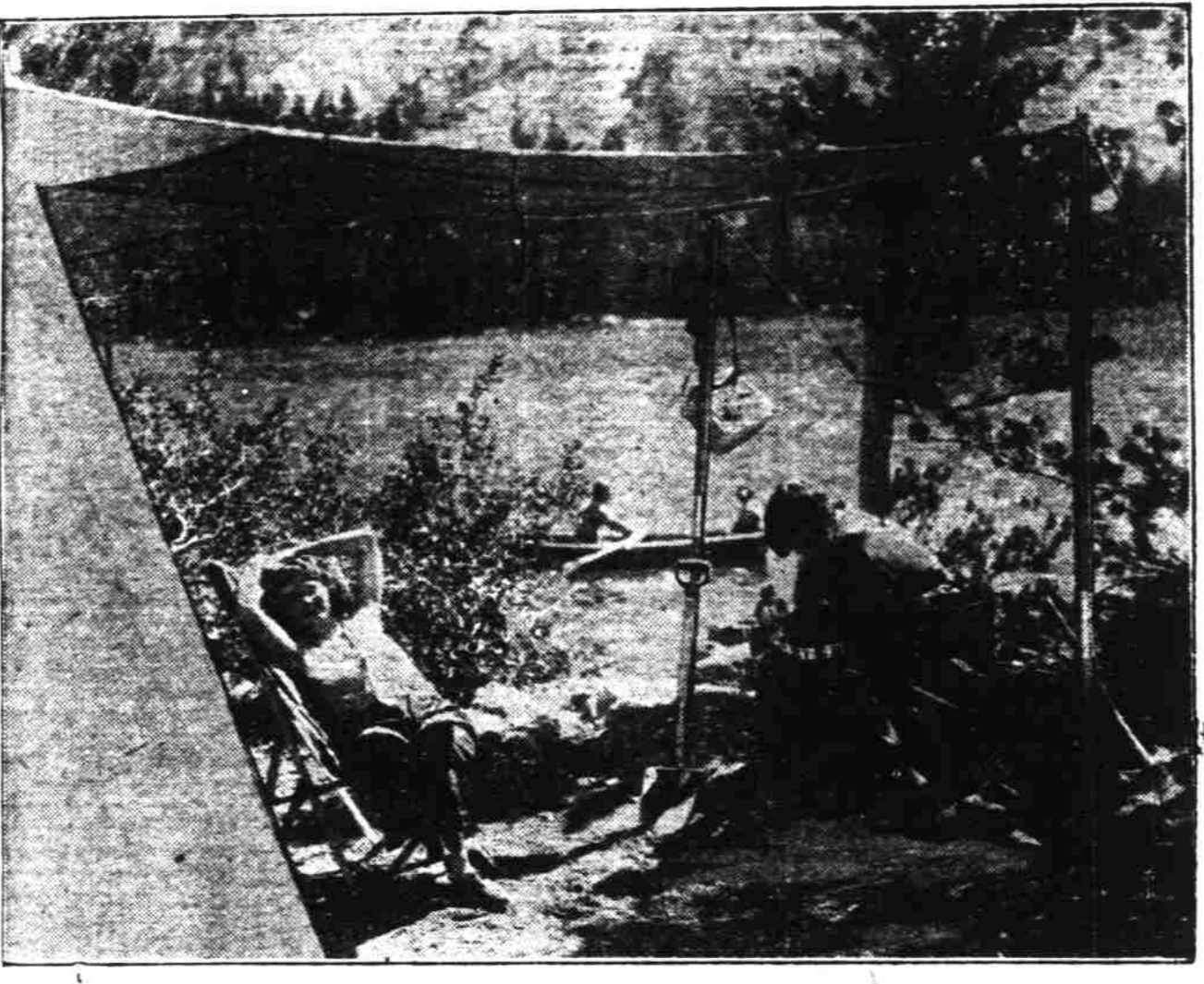
