Vining of Sacramento was second with 45.

The Washington county team won the five-man team shoot for the Oregonian telegraphic shoot championship with a score of 480. Couille and Klamath tied for second with 477. Portland was third at 475. Bend fourth with 474. Eugene and Halsey tied with 472. Harrisburg 467. Corvallis 458. Dallas-Wasco 455. Marshfield 447.

### FINANCE SIDE OF BIG FIGHT TALKED

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—The money changers in the box office windows of Madison Square Garden shuffled stacks of bills and change briskly today as the financial features of next Thursday's championship fight came in for a brief bit of attention. In the camps of Max Schmeling and Jack Sharkey leather flew furiously and the gladiators headed into the training home stretch.

A complete set of figures covering all the financial possibilities of the 15 round contest was disclosed at the Garden and for the first time since the opening of the ticket sale it was indicated on the basis of receipts that the net gate, exclusive of taxes, should run somewhere over \$600,000. Cash in the bank and gilt edge orders amounted today to less than \$400,000.

The Garden prediction that the gate would total \$700,000, fast and permanent previous generous forecasts of the first million dollar affair since Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney rolled up their record breaking \$3,000,000 total in Chicago in 1927. The Garden also revealed that if every one of the \$1,531 tickets issued for the match was sold by Thursday night the total receipts would amount to a net of only \$502,591. Thousands of these benches however, will be filled by complimentary ticket holders.

### JAW IS FRACTURED BY PITCHED BALL

Jake Doner, son of Mr. and C. H. Doner of the Keizer district, is in the Willamette sanatorium here with his jaw broken in two places as the result of an accident which occurred in a ball game at the Keizer community picnic yesterday afternoon.

### SANDE AND GALLANT FOX WIN AT GALLOP

BELMONT PARK, N. Y., June 7.—(AP)—Gallant Fox, with the bruised and bandaged Earl Sande in the saddle, answered the challenge to their greatness today by scoring a smashing triumph in the rich Belmont stakes and capturing the three year old championship of the American turf beyond the palest shadow of a doubt.

This was the big test for William Woodward's big bay son of Sir Gallahad III and Gallant Fox met it by running the legs off Harry Payne Whitney's famous Whirlone, the favorite, in a finish that was startlingly decisive in every respect. Made a second choice to Whitehead in spite of Woodward combination's great record, the Fox and Sande outsmarted and outran the star of the Whitney stable to win by four good lengths in a common gallop.

Only four horses ran in the rain that spoiled an otherwise colorful scene, but the Fox galloped through it as comfortably as he did in the Kentucky Derby a few weeks ago.

James Butler's Questionnaire was third, eight lengths back of the Fox and W. J. Salmon's Swinfield fourth, 13 lengths behind the winner.

"It was easy and all I had to do was let the Fox run," Sande said afterward, smiling through the bruises and bandages he wore as the result of an auto accident two days ago.

ST. LOUIS, June 7.—(AP)—"If it isn't one thing, it's another." So says Manager Charles "Gabby" Street, after his St. Louis Cardinals have dropped ten of the last 11 games after a winning streak of 17 out of 18.

And it's not only Street who is doing some thinking, but also Cardinal fans whose hopes for a pennant had been buoyed by the long string of victories.

The relief started after Sunday and his men left here for a trip May 24, resting in first place in the league standing. After two victories injuries started taking their toll.

Charley Gelbert who had been playing sensationally at short and batting .340, developed a muscle horse at Chicago. Next Paul Friesch, who had made a fine combination with Gelbert in the infield, was spiked at Philadelphia. Then Jess Haines, pitcher, was injured when all on the line by a line drive.

The next regular to be lost was Ernie Ottavio whose ankle, badly earlier in the season, weakened. And Jim Bottomley's injury (thumb and cheek) Hays' arm have handicapped their batting with Gelbert, Friesch, Ottavio and Haysy Ailing. The Cards have lost their batting punch.

Then Street's hurling staff went bad, all of the pitcher's being wild. Only one pitcher has finished a game started in the last 11 and even then Hines lost to Chicago 6 to 5.

In the meantime Street has been hard pressed to supply capable substitutes and his team has dropped out of the first division. But the fans haven't lost hope. They're waiting for the injuries to heal.
