

Merriam Case May Come up for Decision Here Saturday

HORTICULTURE MEETING SET

Issue Hidden Beneath "Local Color" Says Official In Resignation

In case the Marion county fruit growers persist in their demand for the retirement of H. S. Merriam of Goshen from the state horticultural board, a meeting of the state board of control will be called for next Saturday to determine whether Merriam's resignation shall be accepted.

The board of control favored Saturday for the meeting for the reason that the horticultural board will be in session in Salem on that day. Merriam's resignation reached the secretary of state here Monday, and copies later were sent to other members of the board of control. Members of the board indicated that they would not accept the resignation until Mr. Merriam and his opponents had been heard.

Merriam, in the letter to the board of control, suggested that his case be taken up Wednesday of this week.

"Since the original issue has been buried under so much local color," read Merriam's letter to the board, "I felt that the proper solution would be my resignation."

Mysterious Disease Report Draws Fire

Merriam's resignation followed closely upon the publication of newspaper stories in which Merriam was quoted as saying that a mysterious disease had been discovered in Oregon orchards, and that in case of federal quarantine, there would be a heavy financial loss to the growers. Merriam also was quoted as saying that specimens of the diseased foliage had been sent to Oregon State college, and had also received attention of federal investigators.

State college authorities denied that they had received any specimens of the diseased foliage, while other members of the state horticultural board issued statements that they never had heard of the disease reported by Merriam.

The mysterious disease, according to Merriam, has been common in Europe for many years, but is new in the United States.

Willamette valley fruit growers resented Merriam's statements, and announced that they would seek his removal through the governor and other members of the state board of control.

OCEANSIDE CAMP'S ATTRACTIONS MANY

Prospect Delights Juvenile Y. Members Though Reville at 6:30

Scores of Salem boys, mostly members of the junior and younger boys' division of the Y. M. C. A., are already looking forward to first days of the annual outing at Camp Oceanside, located on one of Oregon's most attractive beaches and near the resort which bears the same name as the camp. The first camp period for younger boys opens July 16.

Pleasures are in store for every boy, despite the fact that reville sounds at 6:30 in the morning. And reville means that every boy is out at that time. An idea of what the boys will do each day they are in camp is glimpsed from a typical day's program: 6:35, setting up; 6:40, raise Old Glory; 6:45, ocean dip or wash up; 7:00, chapel; 7:30, breakfast; 8:00, camp duty; 9:00 tent inspection; 9:15, educational program; 10:30, fishing, swimming, games; 12:00, lunch; 1:00, rest hour; 2:00, hikes; 4:00, swim; 5:45, retreat; 6:00, dinner; 7:00, baseball and games; 8:00, campfire; 9:30 taps.

Activities will be a strongly stressed during camp, with emphasis on swimming, surf bathing, fresh and salt water fishing, hikes, clam digging, baseball, volleyball, horseshoes, boating, stunts and campfires. The educational program will be given a part in each day's work, and will include wood working, first aid, life saving, tumbling, photography, marine life, nature study and totent carving.

The Y. M. C. A. camp site is an exceptionally well suited one for its purposes, situated as it is on a plateau a mile north of Oceanside, with a quarter-mile beach all its own and two streams at either end. In the background are wooded hills. Access to the grounds is gained through the old light house road, the lighthouse being on the northern side of the camp. Directors of this year's camps are Ivan White and Bob Boardman, both of the Y. M. staff. Charles Grumley of O. S. A. will have charge of religious education, Burton Cray, of Salem will be social director; Leo Simon, Portland nature expert, will have charge of the educational program; and George Dent, disciplinarian at the Chemawa Indian school, will conduct the activity program. Two of the commissions at the fall election shall be chosen for a term of two years and the remaining three for four years. Thereafter commissioners for each to be elected for a four-year term. While no specific duty is given the newly chosen commission to take a part in the purchase of the water company, it is understood that the council will consult with this group throughout the negotiations for the purchase of the plant.

Included in the duties of the water commission, once the company is acquired by the city, is the hiring of the general manager, under whose authority the entire system shall be conducted. Rules for water distribution, establishment of rates, disbursement of funds, exact accounting of the operating and capital expenditures are added duties of the commission.
