

HIGHWAY GROUP AGAIN BUSY

West Side Association Will Work on Development Program

DALLAS, June 10.—If the number of activities proposed at a meeting of the West Side Pacific highway association in Monmouth, Friday evening, are carried out, the west side will see an increase of tourist travel beyond their fond dreams.

This association originally set up to secure a federal number for the west side highway where it branches off from the main highway at Junction City, and having been successful in this endeavor, is now looking for new fields to conquer.

The McMinnville chamber of commerce presented a resolution to the meeting, in which they advocated the widening of all main highways in the state before new projects are undertaken. This will be used by the association as a working basis for their development program. Other topics discussed were regulation of busses, freight transports and trailers.

Committees to be Named
Sam Dolan of Corvallis who is the chairman of this organization, will appoint a number of committees in the near future to report back on the various subjects discussed at this meeting. Some one of these committees will survey the danger spots of the present highway route, others as to the erection of the federal numbers. There will be a publicity committee, one on legislation and one to look into the matter of direct bus service to California points on the west side.

W. E. North, secretary of the Corvallis chamber of commerce and also secretary of the association, presented a number of maps showing loop trips that might be made beginning at Corvallis, going down the west side highway, either going as far as Portland, and coming down the coast, or turning off to the coast, points from other towns along routes as the new Salmon river highway, etc. The plan was favorably considered and efforts will be made to finance through hotel advertising along the various routes. This same plan has been successfully operated by a group in eastern Oregon, southern Idaho and Washington.

Among those present at the meeting who spoke upon the different points brought up were: E. C. Apperson and W. T. Vinton of McMinnville, B. H. Johnson of Monroe, and Earl T. Lee of Corvallis. Forty were in attendance at the meeting from Amity, Rickreall, McMinnville, Dallas, Independence, Monmouth and Corvallis. The next meeting will be held in Rickreall, upon call of the executive board.

The first man to join the grange after it was organized was John Tekenburg, August 4, 1900 and the first woman, Cecil Eoff Hartley, August 28, 1900.

The first officers elected were: master, Clara H. Waldo; lecturer, Ida M. Hartley, overseer, C. J. Simeral; secretary, Cerice Simeral; chaplain, Mrs. T. S. Kimsey. Ida Hartley Tekenburg and Harvey Taylor Tekenburg, the first member to join after the organization are still members of the Macleay grange.

Mrs. Howd, and Mrs. Kimsey drove all over the country with a horse and buggy to inform the people that a grange was to be organized.

In 1905 there were 225 members enrolled in the Macleay grange which was the banner year for enrollment.

In 1907 the first memorial services were held. They were held for J. Davis, T. L. Kibbey and D. Bowman and the altar was decorated with flowers by the following charter members: J. B. Waldo, Clara Waldo, G. H. Page, Maggie Hartley and Ida Hartley Tekenburg.

Friday night was also visitors' night and grangers represented and the number present from each were Turner 7, Monitor 3, Silverton 10, Fairfield 2, Union Hill 2.

One member, Louise McGee was reinstated and three names, Madeline Callin, Bessie Hise, and O. Baker were proposed for membership at the meeting Friday night.

At the conclusion of the business meeting the group enjoyed a program and supper served at long tables centered with iris and carnations.
