He seldom leaves his home, doesn't want any company, but seems to take pride in his home. He has a son, a dentist in one of the large coast cities. There is a road in to his place so far as the census enumerator found.

OREGON APPRECIATED After Seeing Europe, Tom Kay Tell Rotary FUTURE LOOKS BLACK

"People of Oregon ought to realize what wonderful opportunities and privileges they enjoy here," was the declaration of Tom Kay, state treasurer, in his talk to Salem Rotarians yesterday on impressions of his trip to Europe last year.

He contrasted the conditions in Europe, particularly in England, with those in this country. There taxes are very burdensome; a license for a Ford car is \$75; the aristocrats enjoy luxuries while the masses of poor people are deprived of life's necessities.

"I cannot see any future for England. Where before the war it was rich and progressive, now conditions there are deplorable."

PRODUCERS' GROUP INTEREST GROWING

Organization of Oregon dairymen under the cooperative marketing group now in process of formation, was advocated by speakers of the dairy demonstration train in its recent tour.

Paul V. Maris, extension director of O. S. C., spoke before a group at Tualatin and advised the dairymen to join the organization, which he declared is organized on a sound legal basis and will be under the most competent permanent management its officers can obtain.

The Salem unit of the state organization has gained in membership rapidly and much interest and enthusiasm is apparent on the part of the producers.

A special meeting has been called for Tuesday evening, June 17 at the chamber of commerce rooms and a large attendance is expected since the meeting will be open to all milk producers whether members of the organization or not.
