Seek Men for Reserves—Salem or Marion county men who have received an honorable and excellent discharge from the army, navy, marine or national guard service are all eligible to membership in the Marine Corps reserve which is now being formed here, says Sergeant Mack Sherman, in charge of the marine recruiting station here. A doctor will be here Tuesday or Wednesday of next week to conduct final examinations, and anyone interested should get in touch with Sherman before that time. Members of the Marine reserves may, although it is not compulsory, spend two weeks in military training at San Diego each summer, with all travel expenses and all expenses while there paid.
