Newspapers Move To Take Gangland War In Own Hands

Rathbun, Tribune Attorney, Is Appointed as Prosecutor; Lingle's Funeral Bigger Than Any He Ever Reported

CHICAGO, June 12.—(AP)—With an aroused populace demanding results, Chicago newspapers moved tonight to take over active leadership in tracking down the assassin of Alfred "Jake" Lingle, and purging the city of criminals.

Pat Roche, former ace of the federal narcotic forces and now chief investigator for the state's attorney's office, will head the investigation.

The action came close on the heels of a meeting of representatives of seven leading newspapers which adopted a resolution pledging their organizations and resources to the cleaning up of "gang, police, official, and any other public viciousness."

Chicago today held the funeral of the slain newspaperman. He had covered elaborate gangster funerals but he, shot down by some gunman in the underworld, had a higher funeral than any he had reported for the Tribune.

He lay in a silver-bronze casket while the fellows he had associated with for 18 years listened to a priest invoke God's vengeance on his assassin, heard the final requiem celebrated for him in Our Lady of Sorrows church, bore his body to a grave and then ground out the story for the world to read.

Chief among the pall-bearers was his close friend, Commissioner of Police William Russell. "God will have vengeance on the murderer," said James W. Mott, local candidate for the position, received word that his presence was requested at a meeting Saturday in Portland.

Lorene Langston, Age Two, Wanders Onto Highway, Killed

First Day in Berry Patch Ends Tragically For Salem Couple

First day's work in the berry fields ended tragically yesterday for Mr. and Mrs. Floyd H. Langston of Salem route eight, when their two and a half year old daughter, Lorene, was fatally injured when struck by an automobile driven by W. Stolck, route eight, box 184.

The accident occurred about 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and while the child was playing in the road about six miles north of town on the River road and near Clear Lake. Mr. and Mrs. Langston were engaged in picking berries on the Hillman place and did not notice the child as she strayed from the berry patch. They did not witness the accident.

The child was knocked to the road sustaining a fractured skull, internal injuries and severe bruises. She was rushed to the Salem general hospital where she died at 5:47 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. Langston, who formerly lived in the city while he was a guard at the penitentiary were staying last night with relatives in town. They moved to the country only a short time ago. One child, Roger, age four, remains.
