Commencement Week to Begin on Sunday, Graduation Thursday

DALLAS, June 12. — Sunday, June 15 will usher in commencement week for graduates of the Dallas high school. The commencement sermon will be delivered to the class in the high school auditorium Sunday evening by Rev. James A. Smith of the Presbyterian church. Music for the occasion will be under the direction of Mrs. Gilbert P. MacGregor.

Tuesday evening will be the junior-senior banquet served to the graduates, high school faculty, members of the school board, by the domestic science class under the supervision of Mrs. Lois C. Doughton. Mrs. Martha Fisher Kropp, faculty advisor to the junior class will assist in arranging the program which will be presided over by Eugene Morrison, president of the class of 1931.

Thursday evening, June 19, the commencement exercises will be held in the high school auditorium. Admission will be by ticket, which may be secured from members of the class or at the superintendent's office as long as they last. There is always a demand for more tickets than are available.

Dr. D. C. Poling of the Oregon State college will be the speaker for the evening. Musical numbers will be given by members of the graduating class and diplomas will be presented by W. L. Soehren, chairman of the school board.

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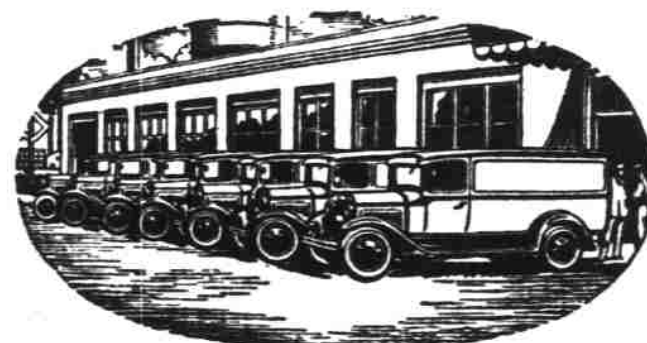

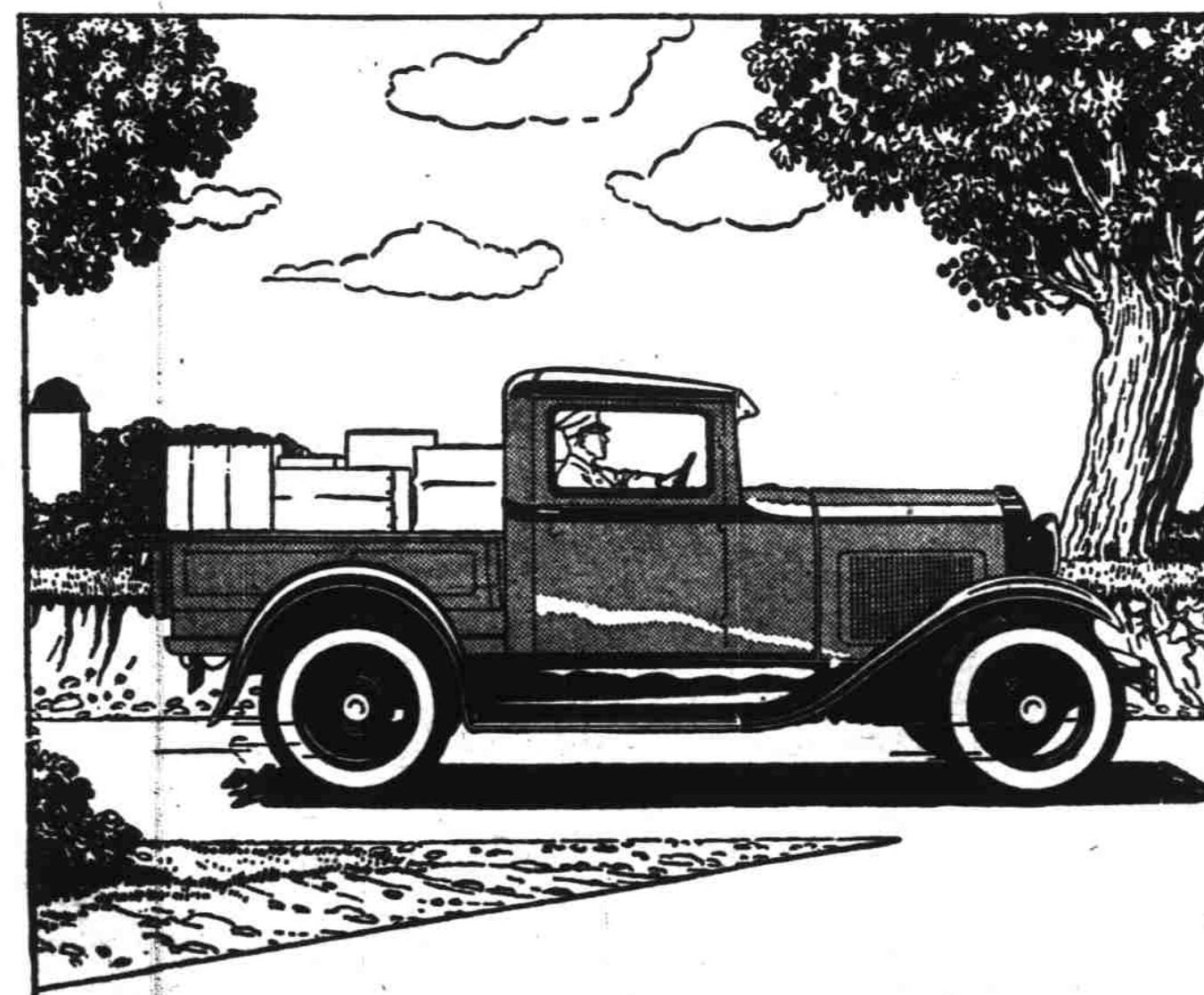
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
