### Big Movie Frolic Saturday Night Will Result in Selection of Cast

The old hymn with the refrain, "Is my name written there?", has nothing on scores of Salem persons, would-be screen successes, who are asking themselves almost that question in connection with announcement of the cast for the American Legion's first Willamette valley motion picture.

That question will be answered, favorably or otherwise, at the extraordinary motion picture Frolic, to be held Saturday night at the horse show pavilion on the state fairground, beginning at 8:15 o'clock. The principal characters will be introduced at the Frolic. The Frolic, sponsored by the Legion in connection with Dagmar Pictures which is filming the valley drama, marks the end of search for local actors for the cast and the beginning of actual production of the picture.

**Good Entertainment Also Is Promised**

In addition to announcement of the cast for the valley film, the Frolic Saturday night will present a varied entertainment to the thousands who are expected to witness it. Besides stunts, music, appearance of the Capital Post drum corps, and a number of enlightening explanations and actual production of trick motion picture shots, screen tests which have been taken of Salem and Marion county persons will be shown.

The screen test showings will be one of the big features of the Frolic and in itself will prove a drawing card for literally hundreds. As late as yesterday people were still appearing for tests, with 10 aspirants coming in yesterday afternoon.

# AMERICANS WIN IN BIG FIGHT PRELIMS

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, June 12.—(AP)—In the semifinal of the Sharkey-Schmeling heavyweight show, waged after the main bout, Al Fay of Charlestown, Pa., pounded out a victory over George Hoffman of New York in ten decisive rounds. Fay gained the decision in a fight that found both cut and bleeding at the finish. The winner weighed 192 1/2 and Hoffman 192.

RINGSIDE, Yankee Stadium, New York, June 12.—(AP)—In the first preliminary to the Sharkey-Schmeling battle tonight Ralph Giesecke, 186 pounder from Long Island City, scored a technical knockout over Peter Brand of Holland, 169, in the third round. The referee stopped the bout after the Dutchman had been floored twice for counts of nine.

In a bloody six rounder, Stanley Poreda, Jersey City, sparring partner of Max Schmeling, battered out a decision over Paul Bianchi, big but heavy footed Argentine.

Poreda rolled up a big lead on points, but Bianchi's face into gory ribbons and won the unanimous decision of the referee and two judges. There were no decisive knockdowns but Bianchi twice half stumbled to the floor in brief counts after stiff shots to the jaw and on the other occasion each rolled to the canvas after mauling. Poreda weighed 196 and Bianchi 212 1/2.

# GRUDGE GAME ON SCHEDULE

### Solons See Red as Alcos Loom Up For Contest Here on Sunday

With one more big stick looming up in the battling order to strengthen a list that has needed it badly, the Salem Senators will do battle with the Albany Alcos here Sunday afternoon. The Alcos are now leading the Willamette Valley league.

It will be a battle, with the Senators still "red hot" over the raw deal they firmly believe was handed them at Albany a few weeks ago. Not much was said about it at the time, but the umpiring that day was terrible according to the verdict of all parties, and some of the decisions against Salem sent the Albany fans booted them.

Umpires that day were the same pair who drew the razorbills here last Sunday, though on that occasion the breaks went pretty even for both teams.

**Due to Report**

Billy Sullivan is the latest recruit to the Senator ranks. He has held down first base the major part of three seasons, and last year led the Oregon-Washington league in hitting, with an average of about .300 most of the season.

Billy will arrive today from Notre Dame, where he has been playing regularly on the varsity, and unless the long train ride has temporarily dimmed his batting eye he is expected to put some punch into the local team's attack.

It is too late for Salem to make a bid for the first half championship in the valley league, but the team will be ready for a finish fight the second half.

# SANTIAM HIGHWAY SIGNIFICANCE TOLD

"The highway commission appreciates the historical significance of the Santiam Pass," declared H. B. Van Duser in an address Wednesday before the chamber of commerce at Albany. "We feel the importance of the highway to be built through a virgin forest that should be preserved from a scenic viewpoint for future generations."

Thus did the chairman of the state highway commission give his pledge of support to the Albany chamber of commerce which for years has labored for the road. Later in the day Van Duser attended a rally held at Sweet Home in which is the road towards the Santiam Pass.

In his talk the commissioner declared that the bridge across the Santiam at Albany was far too narrow but he did not indicate when funds for its widening would be available.

In the 13 years since 1917, the state of Oregon has spent \$135,000,000 on its highways, the commissioner said. Only 19 miles of road is yet to be built. This will be completed in 1931.

# Library Worker Pension Is Not Provided, Word

Oregon laws do not make any provision for a retiring fund or a disability pension system for public library employees, according to an opinion handed down here Thursday by L. H. Van Winkle, attorney general. The opinion was asked by Miss Mirphal Blair, acting state librarian.

Miss Blair requested an opinion as to whether the board of library trustees in any city in Oregon has authority under the existing laws to establish such a benefit, to be paid for jointly by the employees of the library, and administered by the board of trustees directly or through a commercial insurance company.
