

CHERRY PLANT GOING UP FAST

West Salem Cooperative to Handle This Season's Fruit Crop

WEST SALEM, June 11.—Work is rapidly progressing on the new shipping and barreling plant of the West Salem Cooperative Association in West Salem back of the Max Gehlar prune dryer. All of the association pack of Binks and Lamberts will be taken in from now on. Royal Annes will be barreled in brine. This will be a new feature of the association. This year's barreling will depend upon the crop and any other necessary conditions.

O. E. Brooks is president of the association. L. T. Reynolds is vice president and Max Gehlar is secretary-treasurer.

The association will handle all of the cherries which will come from the 215 acre orchard of the Lambert Cherry Company near McCleary. No cherries for shipping will come from that orchard this year but in a few years it is expected that a large amount will be produced in this orchard. The orchard was financed by members of the association.

The building, which is on Edge-water street, is of wooden construction with dimensions of 50 by 100 feet. A balcony on the inside furnishes the working space for the men.

Boxes will be taken below by an automatic equipment, which will be installed. Old equipment used by the association will be used and additions necessary will be made to them so they may handle the 48 to 50 cars expected to be packed from there this season. A spur track is also being laid. Three thousand dollars is approximately the amount to be invested in this new plant and location. The cannery expects to employ from 50 to 60 people during the busy season.

BERRY CROP IS SMALL, BELIEF

Late Rains Retard Growth On Silverton Farmers; Canneries Begin

SILVERTON, June 10.—Strawberry season opened at the Silverton Food Products company Monday morning with growers bringing in small loads. Strawberries are quite late this year because of the wet spring. Also the crop will be much smaller than normal. M. C. Storruste, manager of the cannery, said Tuesday morning that he believed that the amount of the pack this year will be very similar to that of last year, but that this is due to increased acreage. The yield itself is much lighter. Last year the pack was about 60 per cent of normal.

This week only Marshalls and other soft berries will be brought in. A heavier run is expected next week when the Etterberg season will open.

The gooseberry pack, which it was expected would be completed this week, is not as yet completed. Two fields from the Silverton Hills country has not yet been harvested because of the wet and cold weather. However, these are expected in this week and the pack will then be closed.

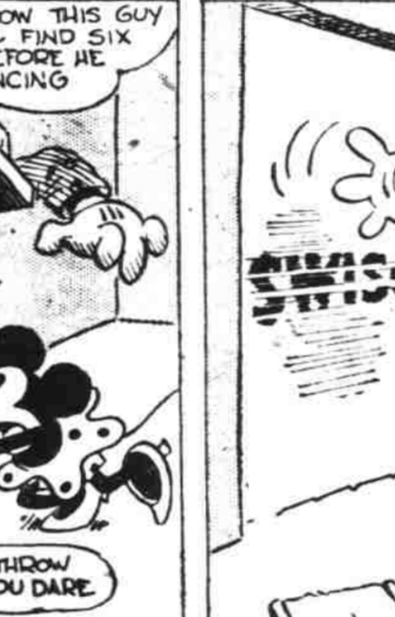

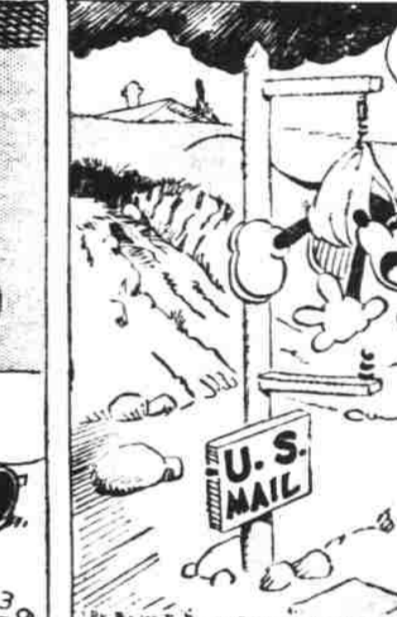
