

Extensive Road Program Is Under Way This Summer

COUNTY WINDS UP MANY JOBS

Several Market Arteries To Be Finished; Two Large Bridges

Extensive road building and repair operations by both county and state are under way and by the end of summer practically all of the work undertaken will be completed, according to reports from the two departments. The state highway department has been patching and oiling crews at work on many of the principal arteries, and with the cooperation of the bureau of public roads, is beginning active construction on the highway program for this summer. Market road 92 from the Pacific highway to the Pringle schoolhouse, a distance of one and one-half miles, recently completed, and 11 other such roads are to be finished during the summer. It is reported from the roadmaster's office.

Among them are the Silverton-Willard road, two and one-half miles; Scotts Mills-Crooked River, 2.3; Cheekboard-West Woodburn, 3 miles; West Stayton-Marion, 2 miles; Fern Ridge road, 3 1/2 miles; Coon Hollow and Strawberry-Matheny; Gervais-St. Louis, 1 1/2 miles; St. Louis-West Woodburn, 2 1/2 miles; Boone's Ferry, Woodburn to Broadacre, Hubbard road, 2 1/2 miles; and the Monitor-Silverton road, 3 miles. Most of these are from 60 to 90 per cent graded, and all will be completed this summer, if possible.

Two Large Bridges Will Be Built

A number of small bridges near Turner, one near Hazel Green, and some small box culverts on market roads are under construction. Two large bridges, one a \$7,000, 8 1/2 feet long structure, will be contracted this summer, the Silverton-Willard market road. The county is to build a wooden bridge between 1600 and 1700 feet on the Pacific highway to Labish road and it will probably be completed this summer, according to present plans. What will be done on the Santiam road project is still entirely problematical, but it is reported at the roadmaster's office that a proposed route for the North Santiam highway will be viewed some time this summer by authorities. This route follows the MHI City-Detroit road and extends along the Santiam river for some distance above Detroit.

Principal among the projects planned by the state is the work on the Roosevelt coast highway. By the end of 1931 grading will probably be completed for the entire route and by 1932 it is planned to have the surfacing entirely finished, and the highway opened to traffic. The estimated distance for work to be completed this summer is 28.75 miles, which includes both grading and surfacing.

A 13-mile stretch of road between Newport and Waldport has been graded, most of it by the bureau of public roads, and will be opened to traffic by fall. The Waldport ferry, which is at present a toll ferry, may be taken over by the state. It is reported that the Waldport-Newport road is the principal project finished by the state this year which will be of material value to tourists, since most of the other work includes only grading.

Complete Grading On Coast Highway

An 8 1/2 mile stretch south of the Lane county line to near Heceta head and about 4 1/2 miles from the Douglas county line to Lake Tahkenich is on the state grading program on the Roosevelt highway, and this, with number of shorter stretches in Lane and Douglas counties, will practically complete grading on that artery. A number of small bridges are to be constructed by contract, and the Rogue river bridge at Gold Beach and Wedderburn planned last summer is to be completed by 1932, it is said.

In central and eastern Oregon a number of smaller highways are to be worked on this summer. The Central Oregon highway will be completed to Burns, and it will then be open from Bend to that city. Tourists will be able to travel from Government camp to Manup upon the opening of the Wapinitia road this summer, while by the end of 1931 the Fremont highway from Lapine to Lakeview will be entirely completed. Other minor state highway work is being done on the Siuslaw and Willamette highways.

Highway Budget Greater This Year

The state highway budget for this year is something around \$14,000,000, an increase of nearly \$3,000,000 over last year's work, when the department spent \$11,277,834.29 on maintenance and construction projects. Much of the blacktop pavement will be covered with the non-skid surface, which is now said to be past the experiment stage. At present a crew is applying the surfacing to a seven mile stretch north of Junction City and it is planned to continue on to Eugene, while the patching crew is working ahead of the surfacing gang and plans to patch the blacktop to the California line.

He said that samples of this pest were sent to the Oregon state college, where the disease was identified. Aird said this is not a fruit pest and could not possibly injure the horticultural industry. He indicated that this probably was the pest to which Merriam referred in his statement at the Van Trump hearing.

Aird then reviewed briefly the activities of the state horticultural board, and submitted figures showing that there had been many violations of law in connection with fruit shipments. He declared that in most instances these violations were corrected by the fruit growers themselves. Aird was emphatic in his statement that samples of all fruit pests found in Oregon orchards and berry fields were sent to the state college, regardless of reports to the contrary.

Aird denied the truth of statements that have reached the state board of control that the state board of horticulture had used its influence to induce fruit growers and small packers to affiliate with cooperative organizations.

Don Upjohn, Capital Journal reporter, said he attended the Van Trump hearing and heard Merriam refer to the mysterious disease as an orchard pest. He also contended that Merriam mentioned the million dollar horticultural industry.

Governor Hamilton declared that it was the sole purpose of the state board of control to protect the horticultural industry, and its members were not interested in "whitewashing" any official.

Secretary of State Hoss said that Merriam used good judgment in not giving to the press the location or identity of the disease to which he referred in his statement, probably would have resulted disastrously to fruit growers in the vicinity where the pest was discovered.

Hoss declared that his statement on the part of Merriam could be similar to a member of the state ranking board making public the name and location of an insolvent bank.

Baseless Reports Are Condemned

All the witnesses, with the exception of Upjohn, indicated that the distorted reports sent out over the press wires, were made for the purpose of getting even with Merriam because he conducted the hearing in which Van Trump was involved.

Testimony was offered to show that no mysterious disease exists in the state, and that they are in the best condition for many years.

Reports in connection with the statement credited to Merriam, said that fruit growers were aroused and that they would appear before the board of control, and request the removal from the state horticultural board. None of these fruit growers appeared at the hearing.

Woodburn fruit growers especially favored the retention of Merriam, who, they said, had not been treated fairly.

The hearing was called by the state board of control to allow Merriam to make a statement, and also hear any testimony offered against him. Merriam did not testify.

55 TO 1 SHOT IS WINNER OF DERRY

CHICAGO, June 14—(AP)—A 55 to 1 shot in the betting, owned by a former Memphis grocery storekeeper who was nearly flat broke before the race started, dropped out of the clouds today to win the \$50,000 American derby at Washington park in one of the most startling upsets in turf history.

The victor was Revellie Boy, never before winner of an important race. While a sweltering crowd of 35,000 stood in silence gasping in the excitement of the surprising finish, Revellie Boy, the rank outsider, galloped home to victory like a champion, beating the heavily played favorite, Gallant Knight, by four lengths.

The winner paid \$113.08 for each \$2 ticket in the mutuels to win, \$29.06 to place and \$14.28 to show and Johnny Best, proud owner of this startling 5 year old, didn't bet a nickel on the chances of his pride and joy, the only horse he owns. However, the race was worth \$48,700 as first money to Owner Best and tonight he is celebrating.

vote from the women, it is believed, and this will be augmented by a share of the business men's vote. A large share of the names on her petition were from the business district. She has taught school and been supervisor in a school system for a number of years.

Arthur Moore, a member of the council for seven years until he moved out of his ward about seven years ago, has had training which fits him for the school position and has evidenced genuine interest in school affairs, as evidenced by placing of his name on the ballot.

Statements Made by Three Aspirants

Three of the candidates, Mrs. Keene, Dr. Pound and Mr. Moore, have made public statements of their policies if selected to the board, each with the reservation that only a careful study of the problems as handled by the board in session can determine each successive step they will take, if elected. Dr. Olinger declined to make any statement, resting his vote on his record of the past 12 years.

Mrs. Keene says in her statement:

"In allowing my name to be placed as a candidate for the office of school director, I have done so believing that every citizen should assume his or her share of civic responsibility if called upon to do so.

"I am not making a campaign for the office, much less a campaign upon any issue or for any certain group. I was connected for eight years with a school system in a city about the size of Salem and fully realize the responsibility of the position from the school point of view and as a taxpayer."

"I believe the problems and condition of every school system are so vital that a careful and thorough study is necessary and if the voters of Salem see fit to elect me it will be my policy to do so seriously."

Do Not Propose Niggardly Policy

Dr. B. F. Pound issued a statement last night, at the same time, correcting erroneous reports of his candidacy. He said: "In an article published in our local evening paper, Saturday, I am credited with favoring a general retrenchment along the lines of eliminating the corps of supervisors employed in the schools, and also the teachers seeking higher salaries."

"When I consented to have my name placed on the ballot for election to the position of school director for school district No. 24, I was actuated by unselfish motives, and deemed it in keeping with my desire to render community service, when called upon, to accept."

"At the time of accepting the nomination formally I stated publicly that I was pledged to a progressive platform consisting of economy. I also denied the fiction about my favoring a senior high school in South Salem."

"In view of the foregoing I will state at this time that I am not opposed to a corps of supervisors and that I am pledged to a program of efficiency consistent with economy. In view of the fact that my friends who urged me to become a candidate and signed my petition are from all portions of the city, and for the further reason that a school director is elected for the entire school district and not for a subdivision thereof, I have no hesitancy in stating that I am not a candidate of any particular faction nor do I champion every kind of bid that may be proposed."

"In the past years I have always been vitally interested in school affairs and have been in close contact with parent teacher associations, in the city, county and state. I have urged my friends to vote at this school election regardless of whom may be their choice and I reiterate that stand."

Arthur H. Moore said yesterday: "You may tell the public that I am running with Dr. Olinger, and that, like him, I am committed."

of Dr. Doney's report was the recommendation that a system of retiring allowance or insurance be instituted. He says in part:

"One cannot be unconcerned about the future of the profession. Old age and consequently inactivity is not far removed from several of them. made to another such matter on file.

"After the report of the referees appointed by this court to take testimony in the disbarment proceedings had been made and Mr. Joseph was recommended to be permanently disbarred, Joseph announced himself a candidate for governor of the state of Oregon. In this campaign he claimed the right of free speech, meaning that he and the newspaper which he controlled could criminally libel the members of the supreme court and this defendant."

Telegram Attacks Him, Says Mannix

"The day after the decision in the disbarment was announced, and while this case was still pending for rehearing, the Portland Telegram, controlled by Joseph, published a vicious attack against this defendant."

"Other articles have appeared pending these proceedings suggesting to the supreme court that now that Joseph has been nominated for governor by the republican party, that constituted a vindication and a whitewashing of all the criminal libels he has published and all the harm he has done."
