

# LICENSES WILL BE OUT EARLY

### July 1 Set as Final Date By Secretary of State

Provision of the new motor vehicle laws which allows Oregon motorists to place the new license plates on their cars two weeks in advance of July 1, the effective date, probably will make it possible to license all automobiles in the state without granting any extension of time. This was announced here Friday by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state.

Records in the motor vehicle department show that at the close of business Thursday night a total of 26,462 sets of new license plates had been issued. During the corresponding period prior to January 1, 1929, a total of 19,933 sets of plates were issued.

"I am anxious to have the work of licensing cars completed as soon as possible," said Hoss, "and have fixed July 1 as the date on which all applications must be filed. It costs a large amount of money to operate the license bureau at maximum capacity, and every day that the department fails to turn out its full quota of plates results in a substantial financial loss to the state."

Hoss declared numerous improvements adopted during the past year had speeded up the work of the motor vehicle department.

The law provides that all cars operating on the state highways on and after July 1 shall be equipped with license plates of the current year.

## REUNION OF BOWN CLAN DRAWS MANY

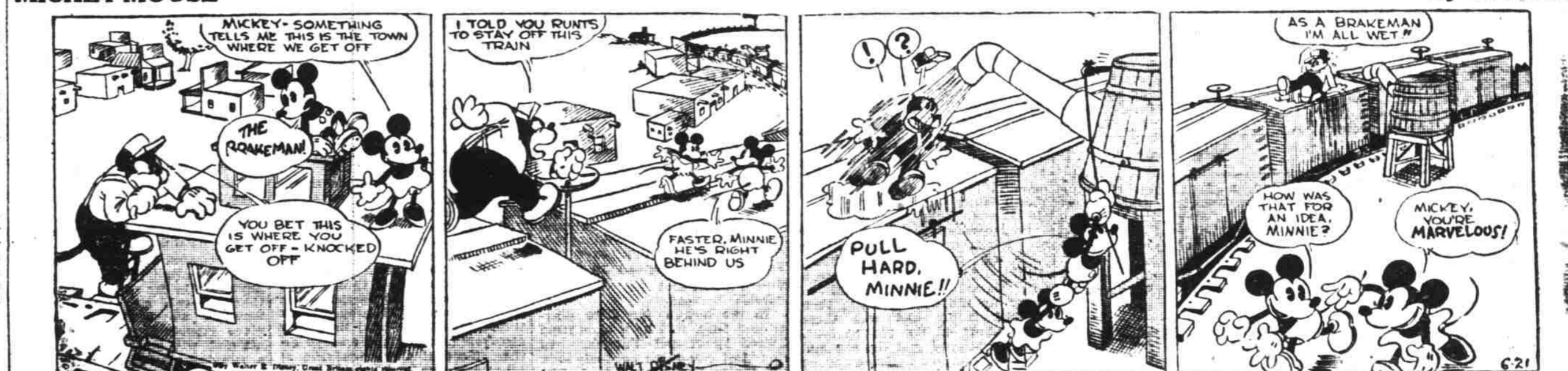

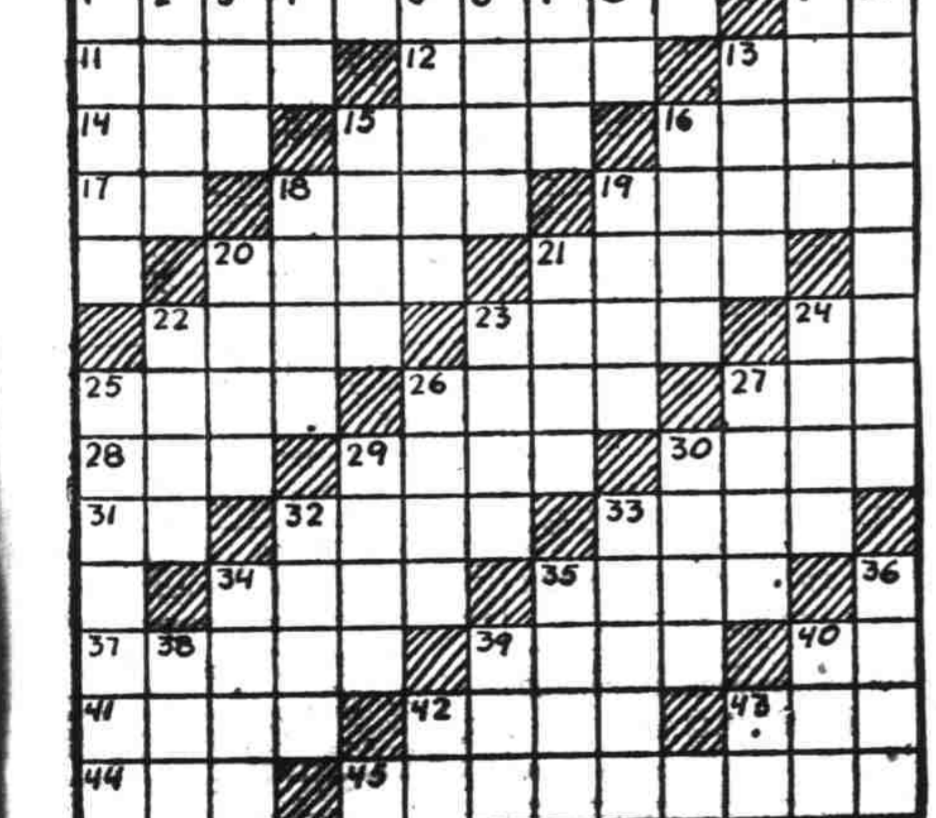
