As nominee Kay, so it is pointed out, would very successfully consolidate the entire party strength as well as attract a large portion of the so-called independent vote because of his prominence and the confidence the voters have in his ability.

NEW YORK-MEXICO FLIGHT COMPLETED

VALBUENA FIELD, Mexico, June 21.—(AP)—The first non-stop flight from New York to Mexico was completed by a Mexican aviator today. Col. Roberto Piarro covered the distance of 2,300 miles between Roosevelt field, New York, and Valbuena field, Mexico City, in 16 hours and 35 minutes.

He exceeded by only half an hour the mark of 16 hours he had hoped to set. Missing an escort of planes sent out to meet him, he landed alone talking the spectators by surprise. Splashing down onto the muddy field but making a clear landing, Piarro was greeted with roars of applause. He and his mechanic, Arnulfo Cortes, were carried on the shoulders of the crowd into the Emilio Carranza hangar.

There they were greeted by President Ortiz Rubio, secretary of war, Joaquin Amaro, and other officials.
Col. Piarro not only made the first non-stop flight from New York to Mexico City, but bettered by more than 10 hours the time set by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh in December, 1927, between Washington and Mexico City. Lindbergh requiring 27 hours and ten minutes for his non-stop flight from Bolling field here.

MANIAC WRITES HE HAS KILLED ENOUGH

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—The greatest murder scare New York has experienced in years subsided tonight when a letter purporting to come from the mad murderer of Queens Borough gave assurance that his mission of death was ended and that he would kill no more.

Residents of the terror-stricken Borough of Queens, in which two men have fallen victims to the maniac's thirst for "revenge" relaxed from the strain of guarding their lives as they went about their daily tasks.

But the manhunt which has been conducted throughout greater New York for a week went on tonight unabated.

CHICAGO FLIERS UP 261 HOURS; KEEP ON

CHICAGO, June 21.—(AP)—Hundreds of spectators visited the airport today as the "City of Chicago" sailed into its 11th day of flight and approached its own record of 261 hours set in an endurance flight last summer. The ten day mark was passed at 4:40 p. m. today with no indications the plane or its pilot Kenneth and John Hunter were weakening.

ed by the so-called new state central committee or the committee composed of members elected following the primary election two years ago.

"A study of the statutes," read the attorney general's opinion, "shows that the term of county committeemen is definitely fixed at two years from the date of the first meeting of the county central committee immediately following their election. There is no similar language with reference to state central committeemen."

Committee Held Continuous Body

"Apparently, however, both the county and state central committees are considered as bodies which continue in existence from one term to another without interruption, but their personnel are subject to change and they are reorganized after each election by the election of officers and admission and participation of new members."

"The law provides that if the newly elected county central committee fails to hold its meeting and organize within the time provided in the statute then the chairmen shall appoint a temporary man of the state central committee chairman for such county central committee from among the newly elected precinct committeemen."

Chairman of State Body Holds Over
This shows that the chairman of the state central committee is still in office and authorized to function after the primary election and prior to the election of the state central committeemen.

Provision also is made for other action being taken by the chairman and secretary of the state central committee which supports the view already announced that the committee is in continuous existence and only subject to change of its members and officers.

"It is evident that the legislative intent was that all state central committeemen should be elected within 30 days after the primary or soon thereafter. The vacancy to be filled at this time by the state central committee not having occurred until after the expiration of the 30-day period following the primary, and the said committee not yet having been called or held its meeting, it seems clear that it is the duty of the new elected or re-elected members of the state central committee to act in the premises."

WOMAN INJURED AS AUTO, TRUCK CRASH

a machine driven by C. L. Webber, 1625 South Church street. Both cars were overturned.
Mrs. Woodward was driving south on Summer when she is said to have struck the car driven by Webber which was going west on Hood street. Eggs, cream and dressed chickens in the Woodward machine were all thrown into a scrambled mess when the car overturned. Webber was uninjured.

BETTER CLASSROOM WORK IS MADE AIM

Improvement of class room instruction will be the central aim in the high and junior high schools next year. If the suggestions made by R. W. Tavenner, secondary supervisor, in his annual report are carried forward.

Education of the faculties of the schools in the purposes and possibilities of the new school features initiated the past year should be undertaken next year, he says. Much could be accomplished through more strict definition of the duties of members of the supervisory staff, in more frequent discussion and some increase in classroom visitation, the report says.

Tavenner outlines the work accomplished the past year, first in which a secondary supervisor has been employed. Supervised study, home room system and the transportation of pupils were all new in the high school. Junior high schools were reorganized, the present basis to be on trial at least another semester. Tavenner also organized two supervisory councils, one from the senior and the other from the junior highs, to facilitate work of rearrangement and reorganization.

32 FOUND GUILTY RUM CONSPIRACY

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 21.—(AP)—The second Shoshone county "rum rebellion" was quelled today, as a federal jury convicted 32 Wallace residents of using liquor to pay the city's expenses.
The mayor, the former mayor, the chief of police and the former sheriff, alleged ringleaders and 28 more were found guilty of conspiracy because of the city's admitted policy of assessing saloons, gambling halls and vice dens for money to "build viaducts and bridges and things, and for the school fund."

Thus in Wallace as at Mullan, officials will be swept out of office and into jail for carrying on policies they said have been "in vogue" ever since Idaho went dry.

Population Now Largest in History

NEW ATOM THEORY SHOWN SCIENTISTS

"gives us precise information regarding the electron distribution in atoms."

The meaning of this information was calculated by Fowler, Intergrals and by the new principle of probability originated by the young German scientist Werner Heisenberg. Under this principle only the probable position of a moving electron can be determined because it is impossible to measure with perfect both velocity and position.

"When we review the many atomic theories that have been proposed and discarded," said Dr. Compton, "it may perhaps appear too bold to say the particular theory in vogue has any finality. One by one the vortex ring atom of Kelvin, the positively charged jelly or Thomson, the minute solar systems of Rutherford, Bohr and Sommerfeld, as well as the tiny atoms of Crehore, the ring electron atoms of Parson, and the cubic atoms of Lewis and Langmuir have given way to more promising successors."

"We replace even Schrodinger's diffuse cloud of negative electricity by a probability cloud of electrons after the manner of Heisenberg. It appears, however, the only one of these many proposals which can account for the observed x-ray diffraction haloes is that of Heisenberg."

PORTLAND BANDITS KIDNAP CYCLE COP

SALT LAKE CITY, June 21.—(AP)—Two bandits, who gave their names as Earl J. Hobson, 30, and T. B. White, 30, Portland, Ore., were captured late tonight at Brigham City, 60 miles north of here after they had shot and kidnapped a motorcycle policeman here and staged three robberies and a hold-up in a wild dash through northern Utah.

The daring escapades of the pair started late this afternoon after they had been arrested with two other men at a temporary park on suspicion of automobile theft. Motorcycle Patrolman Leland Daley and H. C. Pierce made the arrest and Pierce took two of the men, James H. Schauer, 25, and N. S. Anderson, 31 to the police station, while Daley ordered Hobson and White to take him in their car to headquarters. Pierce arrived with his men and an investigation was started when Daley failed to appear at the station. It was then revealed that the bandits had taken the officer's gun away from him and shot him in the leg.

Whether or not the Mill St. church will be continued here next year, or with a full time pastor, is a question. This church was taken into the Oregon conference last year while Rev. Bailey has done much to build it up, financial support is lacking to considerable degree.

Congregations of Rev. Taylor, Rev. Johnson and Rev. Groves have all asked their return, and unless an upset occurs it is thought each will return for another year. Rev. Dr. C. I. Andrews, conference director of religious education will be in attendance. There is some rumor that Dr. Andrews' headquarters will be changed from Salem to Portland by action of the conference.

Rev. E. S. Hammond of Kimball School of Theology, who is now in Chicago, is expected back in time to attend part of the

Several of the younger ministers will attend. Ormal Trick, who has been assistant to Rev. Johnson of Leslie the past two years, will receive his first appointment. He has done good work here and has been well liked by the congregation. He will preach his farewell sermon at Leslie tonight.

Rev. William Burgoynes of Turner and Rev. George Cole of Jefferson, both of whom have attended Kimball the past year and will be at Willamette next year, expect to be returned to their respective charges.

Rev. W. J. Warren, retired minister, and his wife will accompany Rev. Groves on the trip to Astoria.

Rev. Taylor of the First church will preside at the Thursday evening session of the conference. Rev. P. M. Hammond has been asked to act as assistant statistician at the conference.
